City and P. E. in Agreement on Crossings

When the City of Torrance, through City Attorney Briney, officially appears before the State Railroad commission on Feb. 16 to secure permission for 46 crossings over Pacific Electric tracks in Torrance, the city and the P. E. will be in agreement as to the manner in which the costs of putting in the crossings shall be allocated. Tuesday night the city council approved estimates of costs in agreement with the Pacific Electric. These estimates place the city's share of the cost of constructing the pavement at about \$17,000.

The hearing before the commission is to secure the right to construct the crossings. The city does not intend to construct them all at once, but would build them gradually and would in some cases assess part of the cost against abutting property. Forty-six crossings are involved, but only 35 of them need improvements, it is stated.

The crossings are on Cabrillo avenue, Border avenue and Redondo boulevard.

Negotiations for an agreement regarding the crossings have been under way for several years. Originally the Pacific Electric asked \$10,000 for one crossing alone. Only recently City Engineer Leonard and P. E. engineers arrived at a figure acceptable both to the city and the P. E.
