Bandit Holds Up Bank in Gardena; Shot in Flight

Man Apprehended in Lomita Holdup Is Later Freed

They shoot straighter in Gardena than they do in Lomita. Therefore a citizen giving his name as Samuel R. Rufft is in the county hospital with a bullet in his thigh—there because he tried to hold up the Merchants Bank of Gardena Monday.

The bandit entered the bank, passed a note through the wicket demanding all the money in the place and threatening to kill everyone in the building with a gas bomb if they did not comply.

Cashier Adams handed out \$1150 in small bills. The bandit ran out. A phone call was sped to Constable Vickers. Vickers jumped into his machine and gave chase. On the Redondo-Riverside boulevard he forced the bandit's car to the curb. Rufft leaped out and ran. Vickers shot him in the leg.

Rufft is said to have confessed to robbing the branch bank at Melrose and Highland avenues last week.

Police are seeking Rufft's companion in the belief that he robbed the banks of Lomita and Redondo Beach.

After his capture Rufft told police his "bomb" contained only water.

Monday A. W. Olsen of Harbor City was buying groceries in Lomita when someone suggested that he looked like the man who held up the California bank in Lomita last week. Constable Tabor was called and took Olsen into custody. Investigation revealed that he was not the man police were seeking. He was given a clean slate and released.

A comical incident occurred during the investigation. Constable Tabor and men from the sheriff's office took Olsen to Redondo to ascertain whether he would be recognized as the man who held up the bank there recently. Olsen and Tabor and another man sat in the car outside the bank and a deputy went into the bank, asking the cashier to tell him which of the men in the car outside looked the most like the bandit.

When the deputy came out again Tabor asked, "What did he say?" "You'd be surprised," said the deputy, who added that the cashier had indicated Tabor.

Constable Tabor is consequently being chaffed good-naturedly in Lomita over the incident.
