Union Pacific Plan Series of Vacation Tours
The warmer weather marking the approach of summer and vacation times in Southern California has prompted the Union Pacific System to an early announcement of a series of personally escorted tours to the national parks of southern Utah and to Yellowstone. The success which has marked the winter season of personally escorted "all-inclusive expense" tours sponsored by the transcontinental road has brought about the organization of a special tour service.

At the present time a series of such tours are being conducted from Los Angeles to Death Valley. These are to be followed by those to southern Utah and to Yellowstone. All of the tours have been worked out on the basis of a one week's vacation. Six of these trips to southern Utah, described as "The Land of Fiaming Canyons," will begin on June 14, the successive dates being July 7, July 28, August 25 and September 8. This trip will include visits to Cedar City, Utah, Zion National Park, Pipe Springs, Kanab, the Kaibab Forest, Grand Canyon, Bryce Canyon and Cedar Breaks, returning to Los Angeles on the afternoon of the seventh day.

The Yellowstone tours, announced by George R. Bierman, general passenger agent, Union Pacific, will leave Los Angeles for "Geyserland" on June 23, July 21, August 4, August 18 and September 1. This trip includes visits to Salt Lake City and a complete trip through Yellowstone National Park via the West Yellowstone entrance.
