It is sophistication of line which makes the simple chiffon gown in the picture smart. That it is sleeveless, that trimming on the bodice is conspicuous by its absence, that the hemline is rock-lessly uneven, are all points which attest the good style of this model. The interesting flare treatment given to the hemline of this well-made black dinner gown is characteristic of the spring and summer trend of all sheer frocks. These fluttering silhouettes are indeed in promise to the point of exaggeration. Wife Savers

By NELLIE MAXWELL LUNCHEON, SUPPER DISHES Almost everybody likes an omelet and few do not enjoy oysters. Here is a Fancy Omelet—Cook fifteen oysters in two tablespoons of milk until their edges curl. Remove them and add butter and a bit of thickening to the milk. Beat four eggs, separating the yolks and whites, adding two tablespoons of milk to the yolks, salt and pepper to season. Fold in the stiffly beaten whites and cook in a well-buttered omelet pan. When nearly done place the oysters in the center of the omelet and fold. Place in a hot oven to finish cooking. Serve at once. An Easy Way to Make Salad Dressing—Take one egg, two tablespoons of sugar, one and one-half teaspoons of salt, two tablespoons of mustard, one-eighth of a teaspoonful of paprika, one fourth cupful of vinegar, three-fourths of a cupful of vegetable oil, one cupful of cold water, and four tablespoons of cornstarch. Put the egg, seasoning, sugar and vinegar with the oil into a mixing bowl, but do not stir. Make a paste of the cornstarch and a little water; then add the rest of the cupful; cook until the cornstarch is well cooked, stirring constantly, then add the hot mixture to the bowl and beat well with an egg beater until thick. Cool before using. This dressing is especially good with any vegetable combination, for a luncheon salad. Club Omelet—This is quite unusual and one which will be found to be very popular. Prepare three omelets of two eggs each as usual. Spread the first with the dressing above or any boiled dressing, cover with thinly sliced cold chicken, dill pickles and seasoning. Place another omelet on top of this and cover with salad dressing, sliced tomatoes and crisp bacon. Place the third omelet on top and garnish with sliced stuffed olives.
