

Invite Torrance Kids to Plunge

Free Swimming Lessons for Boys and Girls at Redondo

All boys and girls of Torrance schools are invited to the plunge at Redondo Beach on Saturday morning, April 21st. Starting at 9 a. m. on Saturday, April 21, at the Redondo Beach Plunge the school children from Torrance will have an opportunity to receive free lessons in swimming, and those who can swim free lessons in life saving.

Swimming instructor Harvey Hamilton inaugurated these free lessons about a month ago and has had wonderful co-operation from the Redondo Beach boys and girls who have been attending in larger numbers each Saturday. He has set aside this Saturday as a special day for the Torrance boys and girls and invites the mothers to accompany the smaller children.

There will be an admission charge of 25c for each child which includes use of suit and towel—no reduction if they bring their own suits—and the instruction class lasts for about half an hour; after which time the children are free to enjoy themselves in the clean filtered sea water of this very popular bath house.

A prize of two free admissions is offered to the boy and girl writing the best essay on "Learn to Swim," and having it published in the Torrance Herald. All the boy or girl has to do is cut out the clipping from the paper and present it at the cashier's office in the bath house.

The Red Cross gives buttons to all who pass beginners swimming tests.

Life saving classes are held each Saturday morning at 11 o'clock—open to all boys and girls—to qualify for the Red Cross Junior Life Saving test.

Cups and medals will also be awarded from time to time for junior swimming and life saving contests.

All boys and girls should learn to swim and also know the art of life saving, which might be of benefit to them at some period during their life time, and this is one great opportunity that now presents itself to them in this nearby bath house, and they certainly should take advantage of it.



How to Play BRIDGE

Series 1927-28 by Wynne Ferguson

Author of "PRACTICAL AUCTION BRIDGE"

ARTICLE NO. 17

There are still many players who prefer a no-trump to a suit bid, but this kind of bidding gets them into trouble so often that sooner or later they are bound to reform. In the following example hand both A and B were at fault, and as a result they lost a big game and rubber:

Hearts—8 Y Clubs—A, K, 10, 7, 3
Clubs—K, J, 10, 9, 4 A Z B Clubs—2
Diamonds—K, J, 9, 2 Z Clubs—A, 10, 7, 4, 3
Spades—A, Q, 10 Spades—K 9

No score, rubber game. Z dealt and passed. A has a good all around hand, sufficiently strong to justify a no-trump bid; but the singleton heart is a danger spot. A clever opponent with a set-up heart suit and the opening lead would pass a no-trump bid and proceed to make his heart suit. A's best bid with this hand is one club, but being one of those players who always bid no-trump in preference to a suit bid, he bid one no-trump. Y now bid two spades and thus gave B a chance to make a mistake.

B's hand is very strong but contains only one stopper in spades. On the other hand, B holds a very strong heart suit, one that will justify a three heart bid. This bid is much sounder than the two no-trump bid. However, B was another player who had no use for the suit bid. At so he bid two no-trump. Z and A passed but Y had a pretty good hand this point, B began to realize that perhaps Y had a pretty good hand and that a single stopper in spades wasn't enough to insure game at no-trump, and for that reason it would be better to try for game in hearts. So B bid four hearts. Z passed and A now had a pretty puzzle to solve. With only a singleton heart it was practically certain that he and his partner couldn't get game in hearts. He now for the first time noticed his long club suit, so he decided to try for a game in clubs, bidding five. Of course, A should have bid four no-trump, but he lost his courage. Y passed and B was now in a hopeless position. With only a singleton heart, he knew that he and his partner were lost, but he had no way to get out. All passed and A-B lost their contract by three tricks—all because they bid no-trump in preference to their much sounder suit bids.

The following examples were given as problems in the preceding article:

Answer to Problem No. 17

Hearts—10, 8, 6, 2
Clubs—Q, 10, 9, 4
Diamonds—8, 7, 2
Spades—J, 8

Y B
A Z

No score, rubber game. If Z dealt, bid one club and A passed, what should Y do with the foregoing hand? Y should pass. There is no obligation to bid impressed upon the partner of the original club bidder unless he has a justifiable bid, and Y's hand is too weak for any such action in this case.

Answer to Problem No. 18

Hearts—10
Clubs—J, 10, 2
Diamonds—K, Q, 4, 3
Spades—Q, 10, 9, 6, 4

Y B
A Z

No score, rubber game. If Z dealt, bid one club and A passed, what should Y do with the foregoing hand? In this hand, Y should bid one spade. If Z has a sound club bid, Y-Z should easily make one or more spades; thus Y's spade bid is more than justified.

The lesson to be learned from these hands is that no bid is justifiable which is based entirely upon partner's bid. There must be some cards in one's own hand as a basis for the bid; otherwise there could be no such thing as informatory bidding. Each bid should give information as to the holding and not simply repeat or follow partner's bid without any justification in one's own cards.

It is not often that a fresh hand offers much of a problem in the play but here is one from England that is the exception:

Problem No. 19

Hearts—none Y Clubs—none
Clubs—A A Z B Clubs—A, Q, J, 10, 9, 8, 6
Diamonds—7, 5, 4, 3 Z Spades—none

Spades—K, J, 8, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2
No score, rubber game. Z dealt, bid one heart, A bid three spades, Y four clubs and B four diamonds. Z now bid five clubs, A five diamonds, Y six clubs and B six diamonds. Z doubled and all passed. Z opened the king of hearts which B trumped in A's hand with the trey of diamonds, Y playing the five of hearts. B now led the deuce of spades from A's hand, trumping in his own hand with the six of diamonds. On this trick, Y played the seven and Z the ace of spades. What deductions should be made from the bidding and the cards played on the first two tricks and then how should he plan the play so as to make six odd?

The solution of this interesting problem and the hands of Y-Z will be given in the next article.

Course to Teach City Government

Glendale, California, is the first municipality to register a group of twelve students for the Institute of Municipal Administration to be held at the University of Southern California in August, with public officers and department heads from Pacific Coast and Rocky Mountain cities attending sessions on municipal affairs.

Including J. W. Charleville, city manager of Glendale; H. C. Sausenberry, city controller; O. J. Renfrew, superintendent of parks and recreation commission; Miss Ruth Kern, city treasurer; A. J. Van Wie, city clerk; H. C. Vandewater, building superintendent; A. H. Lankford, fire chief; E. Diederich, superintendent of electric and production; E. F. Johannsen, city engineer; Dr. E. M. Miller, health officer; F. E. Dickson, purchasing agent; and J. B. Fraser, chief of Police, cards Nos. 1 to 12 have been issued to the Glendale administrators, registering them for the first educational venture of its kind in the world.

Committees co-operating in creating the curriculum of the Municipal Administration Institute to be held on the Trojan campus August 13 to 18 include the Health Officers Association, the City Attorneys Association, the City Clerks Association, the City and County Engineers Association, the City Auditors Association, the Assessors Association, the City and County Planners Association. The executive office of the institute of municipal administration is at the University of Southern California, Los Angeles, and E. E. Olson, faculty member of the S. C. College of Commerce, has been appointed director.
