State Approves Crossings Here

Railroad Commission Orders Streets Over P. E. Tracks in Torrance

Negotiations covering several months came to a close successful to Torrance when the City Council Tuesday night received an official order from the State Railroad Commission granting every crossing over P. E. tracks for which the city asked. Forty-three right of ways were asked in the city's petition. All were granted. Some of them are already in use but were not a matter of record.

Those which are not improved or in use but which were granted by the order, number 23, including all crossings on Cabrillo, Border avenues and Redondo Boulevard, as well as all crossings at the dangerous corner where Post, Border, Sartori avenues and Redondo Boulevard meet the tracks.

The granting of the rights of way was preceded by an agreement between the city and the P. E. regarding the cost of making improvements at the crossings. This agreement was approved by the commission. The Council plans to install the crossings gradually. The order gives the city two years to make all the crossings and provides for an extension of the time if it is necessary.

Lighting Plan Step Forward

Another wrinkle in the city's proposed lighting system was ironed out Tuesday when D. W. Pontius of the Pacific Electric Railway Company agreed in writing to remove trolley poles from the center of the company right of way on Cabrillo avenue and to favor the erection on the street of combination trolley and light poles. The city, through Engineer Leonard has been seeking such an agreement for several months, to avoid a superabundance of poles on Cabrillo when lights are put in. The company agreed to bear its share of the extra expense of installing combination poles, as follows: \$500 toward the combination poles, \$350 for five extra support poles which will be needed and \$300 as an allowance on the old poles, also to stand its share of the assessment for the lighting system, as it will be assessed against the company station property here.

Engineer Leonard also told the Council that the marks on the curbs indicating where lights will be placed are in accordance with the map he has prepared. The preparation of this map has required several months. Previously much of this type of engineering work has been done by special engineers retained by the city, but Mr. Leonard has done this work largely himself in addition to his other duties.

It was about a year ago that the Council ordered the engineer to proceed with the preparation of the map. The map may be seen at the Engineer's office. It is not a preliminary drawing but includes all details required for actual construction work.

Eshelman Petition in Chamber Hands

Petitions for the widening of Eshelman avenue are in the hands of directors of the Lomita C. of C. and will soon be in circulation. The petitions bear notations concerning the division of costs between the county and property owners.

The new station is located on Cravens avenue, at the alley corner between Gramercy and Marcelina avenues.


Torrance Youth Sustains Injury
