

Red Devil Products Co. Will Employ 18 Women

Silas H. Bradbury, well known in Torrance, has moved back to this city bringing with him a substantial light industry which will begin operations next week in the manufacture of hot tamales.

Located in spacious quarters at 1209-1211 Post avenue and equipped with a large quantity of modern equipment the concern, known as the Red Devil Products Company will employ 18 women. The plant's capacity will be 6,000 tamales a day.

Mr. Bradbury says that the market for better tamales, made in a sanitary plant according to the latest improved methods is wide. The plant will be open for inspection at all times.

Mr. Bradbury moved away from Torrance some time ago and is delighted to get back. "A man who doesn't appreciate Torrance," he said, "ought to move away. Then he will realize what a fine city it is. I found out and I'm here for keeps unless the unexpected happens. Our little industry ought to do its share in building up Torrance and I just couldn't locate it any other place."

Pyle for the work done in Portland and the court allowed him damages for that amount only. That was on April 4. Four days later Pyle's prepared story appeared in Los Angeles papers. It is quite evident that unable to collect an exorbitant fee from me for perfectly legitimate business he sought to blacken my name in the press—else why was the article printed four days after the court decision?

"I had no interest whatever in the speed boat, had no business dealing with Davis except those I have outlined above and fought the case in court rather than be 'stuck' for a fat fee for a legitimate proceeding simply because Pyle thought I was connected with the rum traffic. The low damage Pyle collected—which I admitted I owed him—ought to convince everyone of what his objects were in demanding \$1,000."


