Since the morning and evening of that memorable day back in the mists of time, when Eve lent a willing ear to the insidious furbate tongue of a creeping thing, and caused the cherubim and flaming sword to be placed at the east end of the Garden of Eden; since posterity was oppressed with the scourge of infidelity, and deceit wrote the sepulchral inscription of mortality above the portals of a new born creation; and since the calloused hand of interminable toil set the mark of a beast of burden upon every race and condition of men; the fires of spiritual perplexity have burned with ever increasing intensity in the minds of those who believe the end lies far beyond the superficial confines of an earthly existence.

In planning its completion, the Supreme Architect of this vast system of worlds, planets, and constellations, must necessarily have had in mind a history, some part of which would be intelligible to every race and every condition of man down to the final consummation; when all will be made known. This verity is borne out by the fact that, as yet, the range of human understanding of science and philosophy, has not reached a stage of development which will enable the laity of the present generation to acquire a full, clear and complete interpretation of the sacred writings of God's inspired prophets.

Some of the most important historical, theological and prophetic truths, were however, intended for the guidance and enlightenment of the people of our own day, and to these particular paragraphs, the attention of the great spiritual leaders should be directed; for upon their shoulders rests the responsibility of searching out a correct translation of these misconstrued

(Songs of Solomon 11-9): to the end, that when at last, from across the great camp ground, rings the silvery note of the bugle as it sounds the last retreat; when the battle scarred flag of secular strife flutters to the arms of the color guard, and when the sullen boom of a sunset gun reverberates through the stillness of an expectant world; the rank and file of a mighty legion will assemble, and stand at attention in serried ranks to answer "Here" to the last roll call.

That's why I got those walnut covered chests. They look like a million dollars, and of course the girls think their furs and lipens will keep better in them than they would in a regular cedar chest.




