Wealth of Prizes Are Offered For Legion Flower Show in July

The first annual American Legion Flower Show will be held in Torrance, July 13 and 14. Competition will be open to all amateur growers of Torrance and vicinity. An amateur in this case is one who does not grow flowers with the object of gain, and who does not advertise his product for sale, nor does he use his knowledge of floriculture for gain either as an instructor or as a gardener for other persons.

No entry fee will be charged in any case, although the management reserves the right to refuse space to any applicant. Milk bottles and cans will not be allowed. All exhibitors must provide vases or baskets for their flowers. Also, all flowers entered must be grown by the exhibitor.

For the best general exhibit, including entries in all sections and classes, made by a resident of Torrance, a \$50 silver trophy will be awarded. This trophy will be competed for each year, to become the winner's property after having been won three times. In the general section, there will be prizes awarded for the best entries exhibited by a woman eligible to membership in the Torrance Women's Club, anyone eligible to membership in the American Legion, a pupil of the Torrance Elementary school and a pupil of the Torrance Junior High School or High School.

Prizes will be offered for the best basket of mixed flowers exhibited by a member of the Women's Club, and also for the best basket of mixed flowers entered by anyone. These will be judged 50% for the quality of the flowers, and 50% for artistic effect. There will also be prizes for the best vases of carnations, African Marigolds, Roses, Best Rose, one bloom, any color; large flowered Zinnias; small flowered or Lilliput Zinnias, Asters, and Larkspur or Scabiosa. A premium will be awarded the exhibitor of the best dining table floral centerpiece, to be judged 60% for artistic effect, and 40% for quality of the flowers.

Twenty-eight prizes will be awarded amateurs exhibiting gladiolus blooms, and 29 in the dahila section. For the gladiolus, there will be premiums for the best general exhibit, also for the most artistic arrangement of gladiolus in vase or basket—one division of this open to Torrance Women's Club members only, and the other open to the public—for the best vase of three spikes of any large flowered variety; three spikes of any primulinus variety, including

Grandflori; best single spike of any gladiolus originated in California; best of any Kunderd origin; best single spike of any flower; grower of Torrance and vicinity; best spike of orange or yellow; best spike of red, dark red or scarlet; best spike of any salmon, rose or pink; best spike of any other colored variety; largest single flower; longest spike, most florets on one spike.

For the dahlias, there will be premiums in the following classes: Best general exhibit, including all the following classes: most artistic arrangement of dahlias in vase or basket, other foliage and more than one variety allowed, them to be judged 50% for artistic effect and 50% for quality of flowers; best vase of 3, any decorative type variety; best vase of 3, any cactus or hybrid cactus variety; best vase of 3 decorative; cactus or hybrid cactus dahlias exhibited by a member of the American Legion; most artistic arrangement of Pompon dahlias; best vase of 3 Pompons; best undisseminated seedling, one flower with foliage; best bloom any white variety, exclusive of Pompons; best bloom any red, maroon or crimson variety, exclusive of Pompons; best bloom any yellow, buff or cream variety, exclusive of Pompons; best bloom any orange or autumn shade, exclusive of Pompons; best bloom any other colored variety, exclusive of Pompons; largest perfect dahlia in the show; smallest perfect Pompon dahlia in the show.

For the Junior High and High School Pupils, there are ten prizes offered. These for the best vase of 6 Zinnias or Asters; best vase of 6 African Marigolds or Salpiglossis; best vase of any number of flowers of more than one variety, to be judged 50% on artistic effect and 50% on quality of flowers; best dahlia, any type excluding Pompon; best Gladiolus, any type, one spike.

Prizes will be offered to Elementary School pupils for the best vase of 6 Zinnias or Asters; best vase of 6 Coreopsis or Scabiosa; best vase of any number of flowers—a mixed bouquet; best dahlia, not Pompon; best spike of any type Gladiolus. That the American Legion Flower Show is arousing state-wide interest among those interested in floriculture, is proven by the fact that prizes are being offered by individuals and firms all over the state. Torrance people are accepting the best of the show with open arms, and the flower growers are eagerly anticipating the opening of the Flower Show, July 13.

Episcopalians Will Build Here

\$4000 Church Will Go Up in Engracia Ave. Next Week

The Christ Episcopal Mission will break ground next week for a new house of worship on the organization's property on Engracia avenue opposite the Jared Sidney Torrance Memorial Hospital. The new structure will be 70 x 60 feet, of Mission style architecture and will be of reinforced concrete. The exterior will be finished in a soft tone to blend with the hospital building and the Women's Clubhouse. A 30 foot tower will add to the attractiveness of the building.

About 3 1/2 years ago the Episcopalians built a small frame building. Since that time the congregation has grown rapidly. The new church building is almost entirely financed. No solicitations at present will be made outside the congregation. The church, exclusive of furnishings, will cost about \$4,000. The building will be erected on the west 50 feet of the 100 feet owned by the mission. The east lot will be reserved for a parsonage to be constructed later. Rev. Harold J. Kelly will remain as vicar of the mission here.


