New Court Has Twelve Double Units



The court comprises twelve double apartments, beautifully furnished, and is the property of Mrs. Fannie West of Long Beach, who is inviting local people to visit El Contento any day or evening.

Completely furnished by the Bogle Furniture Company, 434 Pine avenue, Long Beach, even to the most minute detail, there is nothing lacking for convenience and comfort in these ideal dwellings.

The living rooms contain overstuffed furniture, a coxwell chair, bridge lamp, dinette library table and two chairs to match, and a wall bed.

In the bedroom is an ivory or green bedroom suite, as the case may be, with bedsprings, chenille rugs, thick, attractive

blankets and curtains all in blue, pink or yellow.
