**Sour again—and why?**



ALL READY to prepare the meal only to find the milk is sour.

Here's the reason:  
Milk sours through the development of tiny microscopic organisms within it which are called bacteria. The ideal temperature for milk is 40 degrees. In this temperature the bacteria double every twenty-four hours. Thus, if your milk is delivered to you with a bacteria count of 5,000, at the end of twenty-four hours, you would have a bacteria count of 10,000. But if this milk were kept in a temperature of 60° F. it would have a bacteria count of nearly two million at the end of twenty-four hours instead of a mere ten thousand. In a temperature of 80 degrees the bacteria count would be hundreds of millions.

Remember that the milk will develop more bacteria in an hour or two on the sink or stove in your 70-degree kitchen than it will in your Ice Refrigerator in a whole day. Develop a habit of putting the milk back in the refrigerator promptly and it will not sour on you. It should also be remembered that milk can be kept too cold with harmful results to its contents. Your dairy-men tries to keep it at 40 degrees.
