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Fire Chief Asks Caution on 4th

Hannebrink Recites Extra Dangers of Blazes This Year

Under the caption, "What Are You Going to Do About the Fourth of July?" Fire Chief Ben Hannebrink this week issued the following statement to the people of Torrance, urging caution in the use of fireworks:

"It is almost impossible to visualize one of the easy-going chiefs of a volunteer department tick back on his chair and remark that it is now but June and that it is time enough to worry about such things when July comes around.

"But such is not the case with the Torrance fire department. We have always taken a stand against fireworks.

"Just to get down to cases, forget the possible injury from fingers blown off, from lockjaw cases, from loss of sight, from unsightly burns, from countless other injuries, and merely consider the fire hazard. Torrance has been fortunate and has not had any fires that may be traced directly to the discharge of fireworks. But considering the law of averages, we may not escape again this year.

"The officers who will serve for the coming year are Mrs. Norman A. Leake, president; Mrs. J. E. Hitchcock, second vice president; Mrs. Vera Godwin, secretary; Mrs. Harry Schaeffer, treasurer; Mrs. Stone, auditor; Mrs. J. H. Milburn, historian; and Mrs. Carl L. Hyde, sergeant-at-arms. Mrs. L. J. Acree having resigned as first vice president the board will have to appoint another to take her place.
