

"This very low price for a complete 'Iron-All' family service is made possible by the installation of entirely new equipment such as has been recently designed for the largest Eastern laundries," said Mr. Rojo.
Another feature of the new "Iron-All" service is that each family's bundle is washed in a separate net and ironed as a unit, thereby eliminating the necessity of laundry marks or identification pins.
