

## BIT OF NORTH AFRICA AT HOME

"Atmosphere," the kind that carries the observer into the realms of that mystic Moorish land overseas, lends color and romance to the Pacific Southwest Exposition, the World Attraction Opening at Long Beach, California, July 27 and Continuing Over Labor Day, September 3. The Sheba Has Yielded to the Lure of a Ride About the Grounds on a Desert "Taxi," Led by a Sheik.



Long Beach, Calif., July 12.—When the gates of the Pacific Southwest Exposition open at Long Beach, California, July 27, visitors will marvel at the magnificent similitude of the architecture the motif of which was borrowed from Tunis in Northern Africa.

The Tunisian style of architecture more symbolizes in color, form and treatment the spirit of the Pacific area than any other style known. In its various modifications it has been widely used in California, as well as in Asia, the South Seas, Central and South America and all other countries of the Pacific area. The simple, low, flat-topped buildings are ornamented solely by domes and towers, for the Moors, who originated this style of architecture, never resorted to human effigy for embellishment.

The effect presents a walled city of Northern Africa. More than fifty buildings constitute the whole. The principal palaces are to be devoted to Fine Arts, Liberal Arts, Industry, Education, Mining and Oil, Textiles, Land, Community Development, Fisheries, Automobiles, Machinery, Household Equipment, Food Products, Transportation and Communication, Manufacturing and Aviation.

Then too, there is the amusement zone upon which one will find almost every form of amusement sought. Gigantic free acts will be staged daily. Beside this midway will be the huge open air theatre, which will seat 15,000 persons.

Amazing spectacles have been planned, and various nations will present beautiful historical pageants in this playhouse.

What is said to be the largest dining hall ever erected on an exposition grounds will care for visitors to the international affair. This dining hall will seat more than 1,000 persons at a time, and is equipped to care for 24,000 persons daily.

Approximately thirty foreign nations are taking part in the Exposition. Spain will have one of the largest and most imposing structures on the Avenue of Nations. This building was planned by Senor F. More de la Torre, noted Spanish sculptor and architect. The Spanish exhibit, which includes rare paintings, old tapestries, silver and gold filigree work is valued at nearly a half million dollars.

One of the most expensive exhibits scheduled for the Exposition is that of the Persians. This display is mainly rare old rugs and tapestries, and a value of more than \$600,000 is placed upon the exhibit.

The Guatemalan building, designed by Rafael Yela Gunther, prominent Guatemalan sculptor and expert in Indian art, is one of the most attractive on the entire grounds. The exhibit will consist mainly of curious prehistoric relics of that interesting country.

Other nations to be represented are: Italy, Belgium, Ecuador, Argentina, The Netherlands, Mexico,

San Salvador, Latvia, Czechoslovakia, Denmark, Uruguay, Panama, Colombia, Bolivia, Costa Rica, Japan, Peru, Switzerland, Virgin Islands, Hawaii, Philippines, New Zealand, Cuba and Sweden.

The landscaping of the grounds faithfully follows the picturesque effects of palms, vivid flowers, shrubs and vines found in a North African oasis. A group of the most prominent illuminating engineers in America have worked out a lighting scheme which will drench the "City of Lights" with all the tints and colors of a fairyland.

All about the Exposition, dressed in the colorful garb of the Orient will be dancers, musicians, fakirs, snake charmers, magicians, and even the beggars, all of which lends such brilliant life to the streets of North Africa cities. During day and night actors in their makeup and colorful costumes will straggle through the winding streets, leading camels and burros, and giving to the entire Exposition the atmosphere of a Moorish Oasis.

Each day will be observed by the various nations, and each is vying to make its day the largest and best.

Labor of this nation will close the Exposition when more than 50,000 members of various unions and their families will participate in a giant Labor Day celebration, the concluding day of the International Fair.

## Jazz Concerto Is Sensation at Hollywood Bowl

A "jazz" concerto, which created a furore in Boston and New York last season, when played under the baton of Koussevitzky, celebrated Russian symphony conductor, will be the sensation of the second week of the Hollywood Bowl summer concerts.

Aaron Copeland, 37-year old composer of this ultra-modern music, will be the soloist at the Bowl on Friday night, July 20, and play his much-discussed composition. Lovers of both classical music and jazz will find Copeland's work interesting and intriguing.

Albert Coates, who has directed with such vigor and fitness during the first week of the Bowl season, will appear as guest conductor during the second week, with programs on Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights.

Coates' reputation as one of the world's greatest conductors is fast becoming known throughout the Southland, and even greater crowds are expected during his second week at the Bowl.

## Old Mother Hubbard and her New Gunboard

All children cannot make the same height and weight standards at the same age. Some are lean and some are fat, partly from their nutrition and partly from the kind of body which they inherit. Every child has his own body pattern of growth which he should grow into with the help of good nutrition and physical care. The height, weight and age tables represent the averages from many children of different body build and body care. No child should be "pigeon-holed" as underweight or overweight until his particular pattern is understood. However, emphasis must not be placed ignorantly on "natural slenderness and fatness" and thereby confuse inherited tendencies with lack of good nutrition and care of the health. A child who stands the test in all ways of a well-developed and healthy child for his race and build need not be the cause of great concern if he does not exactly fit the averages at every age. Going great distances below or above the standards at any age large type is always a warning of finding the cause.

A little knowledge may be a very dangerous thing in rigidly applying these standards of growth. The scales and measuring rod will always be two good guides of growth if used with common sense and wise understanding. Trying to make children eat, sleep and exercise down to the standards very often defeats the longed-for results. Hard and fast rules cannot uniformly be applied in obtaining health, neither can they be so applied in measuring health and growth. Best results come when the best known ways are applied in an individual way for each child. Make a child physically and environmentally free to grow, then let health habits develop as a natural part of the day's living.


