H. Quady, and will at said time and place strike off, sell and award to the person, firm, or corporation, who shall make the highest cash bid therefor, the said franchise; provided only that at the time of the opening of said bids any responsible person, firm, or corporation,

present or represented may bid for said franchise or privilege, a sum not less than Ten Percent (10%) greater than the highest sealed bid therefor, and such bid so made may be raised not less than Ten Percent (10%) by any other responsible bidder and such bidding may so continue until finally said franchise shall be struck off, sold and awarded by said City Council to the bidder offering the highest bid therefor, in gold coin of the United States.
