

Heir of Dominguez Family Which Owned This District, Succumbs

James J. Watson, descendant of one of California's oldest and most distinguished Spanish-American families is dead at Santa Barbara, according to word received here. Death came suddenly after the pioneer civic and business leader had retired apparently in the best of health Sunday evening. Mr. Watson was 66 years of age. He was born on the old Dominguez ranch, the son of Maria Dolores de Watson and James A. Watson, the latter one of Los Angeles' first attorneys. Mr. Watson, who resided in Los Angeles County virtually his entire life, was connected with the old Main Street Savings Bank in his early years. Later, he became secretary of the Dominguez Estate Company, the Dominguez Water Company and the Watson Estate Company. With the incorporation of these companies, he became director and secretary, remaining in this capacity at the time of his death. Largely as a result of his advice and management, these properties, extending from Redondo to the San Gabriel River, have seen tremendous development. Mr. Watson was the nephew of Mrs. Maria de los Reyes D. de Francis and Mrs. Susana Del Amo. He leaves a wife, three daughters and two brothers, Patrick J. Watson and Robert L. Watson. Mrs. Watson, his mother, was one of the famous Dominguez sisters, whose father, Manuel Dominguez, was the original patentee of Rancho San Pedro.
