### Army Welcomes Torrance Envoy

Last Sunday the local corps of The Salvation Army held public welcome services for Envoy Ivy A. Grace who has returned to Torrance in command of the organization. Recently a private banquet and reception was given in honor of the Envoy at which over seventy Army adherents and friends were present, but last Sunday's services mark the official reopening of the corps with resident officers in command.

Some three years ago the Salvation Army "opened" in Torrance on the basis of an outpost to the Ingwood Corps. Since that time the work of the organization has steadily grown and is now housed in a building at Western avenue and 21st street especially built for its purposes where every branch of Salvation Army activity will be carried on. This includes not only the religious services, but organizations for the recreation and development of boys and girls, instruction classes in home economics and sewing for mothers, a missing friends bureau, anti-smoking league, and a correspondence course of Biblical and other helpful instruction for children between the ages of 12 and 18 years. In addition to this regular work of the Army is maintained with the development of these activities the status of the local branch has been changed from an outpost to an independent corps, and is directly under the supervision of the Los Angeles Division Headquarters with Brigadier J. C. Bell in command.




