New Building Erected at Corner of Sonoma and Acacia

For some time the Lutherans of Torrance have planned and worked toward the end of having a church home of their own. With the erection of a parish hall on the corner of Sonoma and Acacia streets their ambition has been realized. It is nothing sumptuous, it is a very modest church home. In fact it is not really a church, but rather a parish hall intended to meet the present needs of the congregation. The building is a story, built on the rear of the lot and facing Sonoma street, leaving room at the front of the lot to build a church whenever the congregation is able to undertake the construction in stone. The addition of 600 sq. ft. is divided into a kitchen and rest rooms. The building is of stone on the outside and very neatly finished on the inside. It is an inviting little church home in every respect, and it is hoped that it will serve the needs of the congregation and the community for the present and the immediate future. The building has been erected by Mr. Guy, a well known local contractor. To say the least the work done on this building is a credit to Mr. Guy. The people of the congregation are very much gratified with this product of his honest and liberal efforts. The congregation is unanimous in its praise of Mr. Guy. To the American Legion, whose hall has been the temporary home of the Lutheran church during the past, the congregation is sincerely grateful for their courteous and kindly consideration.
