Torrance Japs Arrested for Deceiving Pack

Two more Torrance Japanese vegetable growers were brought before Judge Rippey Friday by investigators of the county Department of Agriculture. Both were arrested in the Central Manufacturing District Market in Los Angeles, one for deceptive packing of peppers and the other for cucumbers. Fines of \$200 were imposed by Judge Rippey, \$175 being suspended in the case of the pepper packing, and \$200 in the cucumber packing offense. County and state officials state that a vigorous campaign will be maintained to guard the public against such deceptive packing, and all growers of fruits and vegetables are warned to adhere strictly to the Pure Food and Drug Laws.
