George A. Proctor Expires

He helped organize the Torrance Athletic Club. He helped organize the Southern California Anti-Anthrax League. He helped organize the community or city in Southern California confronted with an annexation election but called on George Proctor for advice and counsel.

At the time of his death Mr. Proctor was employment manager of the National Supply Company of California, Union Tool Division. During the war he was chairman of several Liberty Loan, Red Cross and Y. M. C. A. drives and was officially commended by the Federal Government for his devotion and work. In 1918 he organized the Torrance Home Guards.

His record with the Union Tool Company was one of steady progress and advancement. When he first moved to Torrance, shortly after the Union Tool Company had moved from Los Angeles he was foreman of the mining department. Later he was promoted to the superintendency of several departments and still later to the office of employment manager. In this capacity he was in charge of welfare and personnel work. Here his human sympathies brought to his office a warmth not frequently associated with corporations. Here too his ability as an organizer stood him in good stead. He organized and acted as first president of the Southern California Employment Managers' association.

Said a high executive of the National Supply Company Tuesday, "George Proctor's ability needs no testimonial. Under his direction as employment manager the plant has hired and absorbed more than 400 men during a recent short period and done it without a hitch or without help. The company and the city have both lost a valuable man."

George Alpha Proctor was born at Vale, Iowa, 48 years ago to Mr. and Mrs. John Proctor. Shortly after his birth his family moved to Cedar Rapids, and when he was four years old moved again to Los Angeles.

Educated in the public schools Mr. Proctor entered the nursery business and studied landscaping. With a natural bent for finding out every thing concerning any task to which he was set he rose rapidly in his vocation and became associated with the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railroad. For this concern he travelled much, laying out 48 parks along the company's main line.

After leaving the Santa Fe he became associated with the Lacy Manufacturing company. During this period he was active in Los Angeles civic affairs and sporting events. He was a fast bicycle rider and won many trophies in bicycle races. He was a personal friend of James J. Jeffries and arranged for the public appearance of that pugilist who later became the champion of the world.

Later Mr. Proctor went with the Pacific Surgical Manufacturing Company where he learned the machinists trade.

He was married in 1903 to Minnie M. Steinhilber with whom he had gone to school as a child.

In 1907 Mr. Proctor associated himself with the Union Tool company, and moved to Torrance shortly after that plant moved.

He was a member of Torrance Lodge No. 447, F. and A. M., and the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks.

In addition of Mrs. Proctor, Mr. Proctor is survived by his father and mother, two brothers, Grover Lyman Proctor of Burbank and Erwin Proctor of Gardena, and one sister, Mrs. Sam Guy of Alhambra.
