Those 21 Amendments—Rodeos, Polo and Horse-Racing—Another Magnificent Gesture by Lindbergh

CITIZENS of California on Nov. 6 will be asked to pass expert judgment on 21 proposals affecting the fundamental law of the State. Constitutional amendments and initiative measures covering a wide variety of subjects will pass for judgment in the voting booths.

THE measure is aimed at rodeos. In effect it would, if passed, make rodeos illegal in California. But that isn't all. Like most reforms of its nature it would also prevent the use of spurs on polo ponies or whips on horses at race tracks.

FINEST PUBLISHING CENTER STRUCTURE IN HARBOR AREA GOING UP ON EL PRADO SITE

Torrance Herald, Lomita News and Automatic Printing Company Will Occupy Beautiful and Highly Efficient New Home

OFFICE SECTION WILL BE TWO STORIES HIGH
Mechanical Departments of Newspapers and Printing Plant Will Be Most Modern Available on Machinery Market Today

Work is well under way for the new home of The Torrance Herald, Lomita News and Automatic Printing Company on the south side of El Prado between Sartori and Cravens avenues. The new structure, designed especially for the publishing and printing business will be one of the most attractive and efficiently planned publishing and printing buildings in the Harbor District. It is being erected by Sam Levy, with P. O. Guy as building superintendent.

The new publishing center will be of brick and white stucco with the Spanish motif dominant. The front elevation will be unusually attractive with large arched and recessed windows and main entrance. On the first floor front will be the general offices of The Herald and Lomita News and the Automatic Printing Company.

An attractive balcony will look down on this main office. The balcony will be utilized as offices for the editorial and business departments of The Herald and News. To the rear of the offices the mechanical departments of the two newspapers and the Automatic Printing company will be housed in unusually well-lighted and spacious quarters.

Experts have planned the mechanical layout so that both the newspaper and printing establishments will be enabled to operate with a minimum of waste motion. The two companies will be operated as two distinct units and the floor arrangements have been laid out accordingly.

With the equipment of the newspapers and the Automatic both under one roof the new plant in Torrance will constitute one of the most modern and completely equipped publishing institutions in this part of the state.

ASK FOR LIGHT BIDS

Council Receives Only One Protest on Ornamental System Tuesday TO AWARD WORK OCT. 2
Bond on File Guarantees Cost Will Not Exceed Pre-Estimate

With only one protest lodged against the proposed lighting system for the city of Torrance, the council Tuesday night passed a resolution over-riding this lone objection and instructed City Clerk Bartlett to advertise for bids.

Bids will be opened on Tuesday night, Oct. 2 at 8 o'clock and the contract probably will be let at that time. The Western Lighting Company, makers of Kling posts which are specified has on file a bond guaranteeing that the cost of the system will not exceed the company pre-estimate.

In case the contract is let on October 2 the contractor will be allowed 15 days before he begins work. It is hoped that the business district circuit will be ready to turn on in time for the Christmas shopping district.

Los Angeles to Pave Carson St.

Rough Street in Shoestring Strip Will Be Improved soon

At last! The city of Los Angeles is about ready to pave Carson street between Western and Normandie avenues in the shoestring strip. From the engineering department Tuesday night came a request to the Torrance council that Torrance co-operate by paying its portion of the crossing at Western avenue when the improvement is put in.

The proceedings which call for the paving of Carson street in the shoestring strip will include improvements on all streets between 21st and Carson in the shoestring strip. These improvements will include streets and sewers. Thus a new residential area tributary to Torrance will be opened up.

Councilman Brady Wolfe requested the council to change Lot 13 Block 72 at Sierra and Madrid avenues from the residence to the business zone. Councilman Maywell moved that the proper proceedings be started and a date for hearing protests on the change set. There were only three councilmen present. As he owns the property involved Mr. Wolfe did not wish to second the motion so Mayor Dennis asked Mr. Wolfe to take the chair and Mayor Dennis seconded the motion which was carried.
