



Woman Citizen Suggests Sixteen City Ordinances for Torrance
The city council welcomes suggestions from citizens, but was taken rather aback at the advice received in a letter which was read at the meeting Tuesday night. The letter, signed by "A Taxpayer" proved later to have been written by Mrs. G. R. Hays, who was present, and augmented her written suggestions by verbal remarks. The letter requests that sixteen noise-opposing ordinances be passed by the council. The communication which was tabled by the council follows:
"TO THE CITY COUNCIL.
"Torrance, Calif., Sept. 18, 1928
"Dear sirs:
"I wish to ask if we might have an ordinance that might be used in curbing all unnecessary noise, such as follows:
"1. That children should not be allowed to use roller skates on the streets; then they should not be allowed to scream all the while they are skating.
"2. That when parents want to call their children home, that the parents may not be allowed to scream so loud that one can hear them across the street and blocks away.
"3. That it be made unlawful to have noisy parties at night so that they disturb the neighbors with their loud noise.
"4. That we have the muffler law enforced on Cedar street.
"5. That it be made unlawful to park your car in front of a residence and honk your horn till you get tired out, or wear out your horn.
"6. That young folks be made to entertain their company in their homes instead of the streets.
"7. That speeding be stopped on Cedar street.
"8. That car drivers be made to fix their squeaking brakes.
"9. That young boys be not allowed to ride motorcycles with their mufflers open, tearing up and down the streets like mad demons.
"10. That landlords and landladies should be responsible for the noise of their tenants.
"11. Such as putting on a bathing suit, then go out in your lawn, turn on the cold water, then scream so loud that you are heard all over the neighborhood and surrounding country.
"12. That children be made to keep off the streets where there is traffic or cars going all the time.
"13. That when people leave home, they will not be allowed to leave their dog or dogs tied up in their garage, to howl till they return.
"14. That the big trucks be made to close their mufflers when in city limits.
"15. That children be made to keep a little more quiet in the city limits.
"16. That car drivers be compelled to make less noise with their cars, such as racing their engines, honking their horns as if they were mad men and women, instead of using our streets as they should.
"A tax payer."
