After enjoying the latest craze for this new-fangled flu I have got a few suggested ideas.

Mustard should be set on hot dawgs and not put on sick birds.

Mustard plasters are made of woolen cloth, but they are best when they are not felt.

We didn't have no clock to ring when the mustard plasters should have been taken off. That was the big mistake. A mistake like that sure burns you up.

The card index system is better. Because in addition to the missus and a nurse you can then have a couple of stenographers or filing clerks in the room. This cheers things up.


