Petroleum Geology Class Opens Tuesday

Where to dig for oil and where such efforts would be futile is included in a Tuesday evening college course in Petroleum Geology which opened at 7 p. m., Sept. 18 at University College, 132 E. 7th street, Los Angeles.

Designed to aid the average investor in oil stocks or oil leases, and not requiring previous expert knowledge of geology, chemistry, or mathematics, the 12-week Tuesday night course will include information on the origin of petroleum, how and where it occurs in commercial quantities and methods of production, refining, merchandising, and financing the petroleum products.

Beginning with the history and development of the petroleum industry, lectures will include descriptions and comparisons of eastern fields, mid-continent fields, Arizona and Nevada, San Joaquin Valley, Santa Maria, Ventura, Sespe, Mojave Imperial Valley, Los Angeles, Imperial, Puente Hills, Santa Paula, Long Beach, San Pedro, Camarillo, and other locations.

Enrollment is open to the oil investor, broker, salesman, lessor, lessee, driller, and the non-technical man or woman who wishes concrete knowledge and information dealing with the origin and location of oil fields, surface indications, migration of petroleum and valuation of oil fields.

Full information regarding the 12 sessions may be secured at the initial meeting on Tuesday evening, September 18th, on the 13th floor of the Transportation Building, 7th and Los Angeles streets, Trinity 1701.



MAKING THE GARDEN AHEAD OF TIME

Talk to any successful gardener and he will tell you that for really one hundred percent results you have to start work at least six months ahead. He doesn't always mean by this that the seeds, shrubs or whatever you use must always go into the ground then, but merely that the plan of the garden ought to be worked out and, in very many cases, actual work started on the preparation of the soil.

So the little annual flower garden suggested here can really be started this fall—laid out, the flag-stone walk put in place, the beds dug, and the shrubs planted, at the corners and along the edges where their presence is indicated. By doing these things now the whole place will have a chance to get settled over the winter in preparation for the flower seed sowing next spring.

Eleven Torrance Students Enroll At U. C. L. A.


Los Angeles, Sept. 20—Eleven young men and women from Torrance are expected to resume their studies at the University of California at Los Angeles when instruction opens this week.




