That Annual Pest of Mosquitoes An Open Letter to Health Dept. We Want Some Action Next Year

To J. L. Pomeroy County Health Officer, and Henry C. Smiley, district health officer in charge of Torrance work.

Gentlemen:—

We have at hand your annual report to the Torrance city council. It details the work you accomplished during the past year in this city.

We note that you have made 12 visits in regard to communicable diseases in our city.

We note that 11 visits have been made in the child welfare division.

We note that 77 sanitation and food inspection visits have been listed.

We note that you have been especially active in the tuberculosis division in this district.

We note that you have made 22 milk tests and 3 diphtheria cultures in your laboratory division.

All of this is very well and we feel that the cost of \$1,000 for your services for a year is well expended.

But we would be lacking in candor if we did not point out one notable failure on your part. It is a failure of which every man and woman in Torrance is aware.

We do not mention in your report any mention of any activity directed toward the elimination of the mosquito nuisance in this district.

Torrance is not niggardly in the spending of money for sanitation and health measures. But Torrance has the right to expect complete service for its money—and Torrance feels that the health authorities upon whom we depend for complete service have failed signally in allowing the mosquito nuisance to pass without notice.

Torrance believes that health authorities each year should see to it that mosquito breeding places are properly oiled and that every means

be taken to rid the people of this city and this district from the annual visits of the pestiferous swarms.

Your report reveals no investigation of the nuisance at any time. Possibly the mosquito problem has never been called to your attention. In that case your negligence may be pardoned. However, Torrance feels that it is up to you to prevent recurrence of the mosquito nuisance next year.

We trust—now that the matter has been brought publicly to your attention that you will find out all of the mosquito breeding places in this district and see to it in 1929 that the swarms are not allowed to pester the people of the district next summer.

birdman. But all of us in the workaday world can pay a little more attention to doing little things in a big way.

Lindbergh is more than an aviator. He is chivalry, knightly reborn.

THEY do a lot of talking in the East about our California earthquakes.

Yet tremors are a scarce article out here. Even when we experience one little damage is done. Only once in a decade is a building shaken down.

The worst of our quakes does less damage than one full-sized tornado sweeping its pathway of ruin over the face of the middle-western prairie—or a hurricane roaring off the Caribbean to devastate the littoral of Florida.

Tornadoes are common occurrences in the flat grain belt. The Caribbean is a dire cradle of sweeping hurricanes speeding north to wipe out cities and deal out death.

When it comes to safety from the lashings of rampant nature California is to be envied.

We say this not exultantly—for the wind-swept regions of the prairie and the Florida coast have our deepest sympathies.

THE United States led the way in the Kellogg-Briand war-out-lawing treaties. Wherefore Europe now looks to us for leadership in removing the cause of war as they now exist. Uncle Sam is in an embarrassing position.

If we are to be the great peacemaker, argue Europeans, then we should act the part. Europe says the chief international irritant at present is reparations. All right, so far. But Europe thinks about reparations as directly linked to Europe's debt to us. We, on the other hand, insist that Germany's debt to the Allies has nothing to do with the Allies' debts to us.

Now the League of Nations is proposing a conference on reparations—and debts—inviting us in. If we refuse to consider reparations as related to debts European politicians will point publicly to the contention that as a peace-maker we are a fake. And there you are.

The State Department has some hard work laid out for itself.


