

Last Sunday the game between Torrance and the Redondo Merchants drew the biggest crowd of fans which ever watched the local outfit work. The Torrance gang won the ball game by a score of 8 to 3.

Heid Lead
The locals took the lead from the beginning and never were in danger afterwards. A lone tally in the first followed by four more in the second gave them a comfortable margin and then their attackwork seemed to be on the verge of decline while the Redondos managed to get their runs in the fifth when Thomas doubled and Martin walked, both scoring following Edward's single. Their third score was made in the sixth when Frost just missed a hard chance of catching Watkins' fly and Waldo Cox tripled to score the former.

Frost led the batting attack with three singles out of four trials but on the whole the locals were taking things too easy to show their true hitting abilities.

Giminez Stars
The flash for Torrance was "Frenchy" Giminez who in the sixth was walked with two out; he stole second and then third and came home safe by a whisker when Frost singled. His daring base running was the outstanding thing of the day.

How I wish we had known of this place sooner; I was sick for over a year before we knew any thing of Olive View Sanitarium. The care that we get from nurses and the doctor, and the food is all and more than a lot of our friends know how to get or prepare for us. I cannot begin to tell you all. 
east of our bought and a sanitorium built for ex-service men and women. The U. S. is now taking care of several hundred men and women there. The advertising we are getting from their work is more than repaying our taxpayers for their expenditure in Olive View.

I was talking to one of Lomita's heaviest taxpayers who visited me the other day and he expressed himself in effect, as follows: "I am proud that I have the privilege of living in Los Angeles county, a county that is governed by such supervisors, men that are qualified to handle millions of dollars every year as efficiently as they do. While some disgruntled people managed to get them before the grand jury no testimony was forthcoming to convict any of them. They, one and all, came clean as a hound's tooth. I am surprised that there is a solitary voter who could be persuaded to cast a vote against such men. I know they would not if they knew, as I do, what the present supervisors have done, and are doing for the people of Los Angeles county every day. The people of Los Angeles school district have no one but Jack Bean to thank for the magnificent school houses they have

today. Several years ago when he was on the school board, Margie, you were living in an outlying part of that district with no fire protection. The directors of the district had planned to erect a frame building, a fire trap for our children to attend school in.
