

A. Larsen, the Norwegian whaler that was taking Commander Richard E. Byrd, crew, machine, bag and baggage down south, where they will politely dump him off and go on about their business of whaling.

Mobs of people are crowding the little dock, where the long black whaler is in port. Going closer, (which is tough going on account of everybody wanting to be the closest one), a rope railing stops traffic—then to smile at the policeman on guard at the gangplank, and tell him I'm a reporter from the Torrance Herald, and just as if it was the biggest paper on earth.
