

Byrd Talks from Ship to Mother and Brother in East



Commander Richard E. Byrd made his last telephone call in the United States when he talked to his mother in Winchester, Virginia, just before he sailed from San Pedro for his two or more years' journey to the south pole regions. Before weighing anchor of the whaler C. A. Larsen at Los Angeles Harbor on Wednesday, October 10, preparatory to his sailing for the scientific quest of the antarctic region, Commander Richard E. Byrd made long distance telephone calls to his mother, Mrs. R. E. Byrd at Winchester, Virginia, and to his brother, Governor Harry

Byrd of Virginia, at Richmond. A special telephone line was placed on board the large whaler by the telephone company so that the aviator-explorer could bid farewell to his family whom he will not see for two or more years, during which time he and his companions expect to carry on American explorations in the antarctic.


