**Soon to Start
Work on Tunnel**

Mountains and hills to the north and northeast of this area have always proved a barrier to transportation, traffic getting through by taking advantage of Cahuenga pass and other passes. Present roads have proved insufficient, however, so plans are now being made for tunnels to open up new highways.

The first of these tunnels will be on Sepulveda boulevard, under Mulholland highway. This major traffic project, recommended by the traffic commission, will offer a new short cut from San Fernando valley to the harbor.

Plans for the tunnel, to be 655 feet long and cost \$400,000, will be completed within 21 days, it was stated at the city engineering department. Construction is scheduled to start within a few months. The road leading to the tunnel will be rough graded at first, with pavement to be installed later. The road will be 56 feet wide, and the grade will not exceed four and one-half percent.
