

### Torrance Schools Join in Nature Study Trip

Hundreds of School Children Visit Pt. Firmin to Study Sea Life

One hundred fifty boys and girls of the 4th, 5th and 6th grades of the Elementary School enjoyed a trip to Point Firmin Monday. Annually, the nature study department of the Los Angeles City Schools, under the guidance of Dr. Edwards, has a day's trip to Point Firmin to study sea life. There were in all about 2700 boys and girls climbing over the rocks there, all eager to find specimens. Teachers and students have been making an intensive study of sea life, including shells and mollusks, for the past month, and the children were delighted to find many of the specimens they had studied about at school. The Pacific Electric railway gave special rates to the boys and girls. There were three special cars from Torrance and a happy time was enjoyed by all the boys and girls.

### SCHOOL NEWS

#### ELEMENTARY

Torrance Elementary school paper drive—the second drive of the year, was held last Friday. Parents and friends co-operated with them, and \$53.20 was the financial return. First prize of \$3 went to Mrs. Young's B6 class, the second prize to Mrs. Haskins A6 class. Next month the second prize will be given to the primary room bringing in the most papers. Part of the money taken in on the first drive helped to purchase an electric clock for the school. Mrs. Josephine Lynch has been appointed to take the opportunity room. She comes highly recommended from the Arlington school, where she has had six years experience in that work. An opportunity room is being formed for the smaller children by Mrs. Powell. Pupils are to be sent from six surrounding schools. Miss Carlson is the new kindergarten teacher at the Fern street school. She takes Mrs. Horgan's place, who since her marriage is Mrs. Thomas McDonough. Including the teachers at the Fern street school, the Elementary school now has 34 teachers. Dr. Robinson, of the Los Angeles County Health Department, will be at the school Thursday, November 1, to give diphtheria toxin anti-toxin free to all children whose parents so desire. Permanent immunization against diphtheria is usually accomplished by one series of inoculations, (3 small injections, given a week apart). However, one painful result follows the repeating, as the child's reaction depends largely on the degree of immunity it has. That is, if a child is already immune, it will have no great effect from the second series of injections. Therefore, mothers may feel a little safer to have their children take the T. A. T. the second time. "Wild" children under 10 years are the most susceptible to diphtheria, and the doctor will be glad to give the T. A. T. to any child who has the written consent of his parents, or who is accompanied by the parents.

### Philharmonic Next Concerts Sun. and Thurs.

Hazel Ellvill Rhodes, soprano, to be soloist at the opening popular concert of the Philharmonic orchestra, Sunday afternoon, November 4, at the Philharmonic auditorium. Mrs. Rhodes was for five years soprano soloist of the Pasadena Presbyterian church, succeeding to the position of Marie Tiffany. Mrs. Rhodes held this position until she resigned to pursue a year's work in New York City. While there she was in much demand for concert work and in the larger churches as soloist. Mrs. Rhodes has appeared with the Los Angeles Grand Opera Association, an Lisabeta in "La Cenerentola" and this will be her second appearance with the Philharmonic orchestra. The second symphony pair of concerts of the Los Angeles Philharmonic orchestra, Georg Schmevoigt conductor, will take place at the Philharmonic auditorium, Thursday evening, November 8 and Friday afternoon, November 9. Felix Salmond, noted English cellist, will be the soloist, playing concerto for cello and orchestra in D minor, by Lalo. A number to be given first hearing at these concerts is Symphony No. 1 in E Flat major "The Rustic Wedding" by Goldmark; Wedding March, Bridal Song, Serenade, in the Garden, Rustic Dance. On this same program Conductor Schmevoigt has programmed a number by Ernest Bloch "Scherzo" (Solomon) Hebrew Rhapsody, with cello obligato by Felix Salmond, which will be given first hearing in Los Angeles.


