



Cudahy's lone tally was garnered in the sixth, when both pitchers loosened up for a few minutes and allowed the opposing batters to get next to their slants.

Both sides played air-tight ball, not an error being made on either side.

Ferguson had the Meatmen swinging at his elusive slants and set down 12 by the strike-out method, while Rogers of the Meatmen obliged by fanning 6.

Honely for the visitors was the hero at bat, and he was responsible for two of the Cudahy's hits.

Torrance will meet the International Studios next Sunday on the C. C. M. O. grounds.

Gauchos Romp on Torrance

Bury Local High Gridders Under Heavy Score 52 to 6

Narbonne's fighting Gauchos galloped rough shod over Torrance in a one-sided game last Friday on the Torrance field and piled up a score of 52-6. Torrance's lone touchdown came in the last quarter on an end run by Pennington.

Torrance quarter after most of Narbonne's first string men had been removed from the game. Narbonne was held to one touchdown the first quarter as the gun was fired with the ball on the Torrance one yard line. Captain Santich carried 11 touchdowns for N. A. N. Morginson booted three place kicks across out of five attempts at goal after touchdown and Wolverton passed to Robinson for another point.

Every Narbonne player got into the game for at least a quarter and most of the second string got in for a half. Had the first string remained in the entire game the score would undoubtedly have been larger and Torrance held scoreless. Outstanding features of the game were the brilliant open field running of Harry Morginson, and the terrific line plugging of Captain Jack Santich. Wolverton, although the lightest man on the field displayed excellent field generalship at quarter and proved to be a real star. J. D. Stitts played a fine game at half and Robinson also looked good although handicapped by a bad leg. Frownfelter and Buck at tackles threw Torrance for repeated losses although West and Ables at ends charged so fast that the tackles were relieved of much work. As usual Johnny Powers excelled at guard and Odell Clayton proved a stone wall. Hironata, Jeter, Robb and Rugraff all looked good and Holman knocked down several Torrance passes. The score 52-6 was the largest run up by a Southern California high school to date in league competition. Narbonne still has a chance at the league title in case Bell is defeated. Next week Narbonne plays the powerful Rils team on

the latter's grounds and as Bell barely beat Rils 13-0 last Friday a tough game is expected.


