RECIPES

Golden State Toasted Cheese Sandwich
Grate Golden State American or Pimento Cheese by rubbing thru grater, then cream with a little butter until smooth. Spread on slices of bread, buttered lightly. Put two slices of bread together and toast until delicately brown on both sides. Serve at once.

Pork Chops and Potatoes En Casserole
1 cup Borden's Evaporated Milk
1/2 cup water.
4 medium-sized potatoes, sliced.
4 pork chops.
Salt and pepper.
1 tablespoon butter.
A little flour.
Place a layer of potatoes in a buttered casserole. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Dredge lightly with flour and dot with bits of butter. Repeat. Dilute the milk with the water; bring to the scalding point, and pour over the potatoes. Place on top the chops, seasoned with salt and pepper. Place in a hot oven and bake until the potatoes are tender and the chops well cooked and browned.
