THAT CAR OF YOURS

If it is found necessary to drive through sand, deflate the tires and traction will be better.

An advanced spark in the starting of the motor will sometimes cause it to kick back, which will injure the starter and probably tear out teeth on the flywheel.


Examine your fan belt frequently and replace it if it is badly worn or stretched. Since a belt sometimes is cut or snapped, it is advisable to carry a spare one.

Don't short the ignition by driving fast through water. Many motorists do not think of this until the water of puddles and ditches has been splashed through the radiator on the motor.

Pyroxylin Is Proving Fine Finish for Cars

Ford Factory Adopts New Finish After Thorough Test

The "pyroxylin" finish of the new Model A Ford cars is the result of many years of experimental and testing operations in the Ford laboratories and paint shops.

Pyroxylin is a lacquer finish with a cellulose base and, like most lacquers now used in the finish of automobile bodies, is a great improvement over the old paint and varnish finishes that used to crack, "check" and fade under exposure to weather.

But more than five years of experiment and testing under all sorts of weather conditions have developed methods of mixing and applying pyroxylin so as to utilize to the fullest possible degree all of its natural advantages.

The result is a uniform, smooth, durable finish in attractive and lasting colors which has attracted particular attention wherever the new Model A Ford cars have been seen.

Long before the Model A Ford car was designed, the Ford Motor Company was experimenting with pyroxylin. For several years approximately 300 company service cars painted with various pyroxylin finishes have been under observation by the testing laboratory in the Highland Park paint factory. One of the earliest of these cars, after five years of exposure to all sorts of weather, still has an excellent, fast color finish that shows no trace of "checking" or peeling.

Today before the new Ford car is given its final "dress" of color, both the pyroxylin which goes on the body and the enamel with which the fenders are finished are given a chemical analysis and artificial and natural weather tests. These analyses insure uniform flexibility and adhesive quality.

Utmost care is used to insure non-fading and uniform colors. Both raw pigments and finished lacquers are tested in a specially designed "fade-o-meter" for fading and durability. They are also examined both before and after the above tests in a color analyzer. This splitting any color into its simplest hues, detects and accurately measures the slightest fading or other variation from standard.

The weather and durability tests are interesting. The system gives, in a period of 100 hours, a test equivalent to about seventy days of exposure to weather. Panels painted with pyroxylin pass from ordinary room temperature into a dust chamber where they are sprayed with wind-driven dust similar to that likely to be encountered in dust storms. Then they are subjected to "ultra-violet" rays much like those of the sun, but of far greater intensity. Next they are sprayed with warm water, after which they pass into a chamber in which the temperature is 15 degrees below zero. This complete cycle is repeated over again each two and a half hours for 100 consecutive

L. A. Police Urge Use of "Safeturn" Signal Device

Believing the adoption and use of a mechanical signal for automobiles would greatly reduce the number of accidents, police departments in Los Angeles and surrounding cities are urging the use of the new "Safeturn" signal, recently approved by the State of California, as a legal substitute for the old-fashioned hand signal.

The success of recent safety drives conducted in Hollywood is largely responsible for the action taken by other police departments.

This new signal which is operated by vacuum, by merely flipping the finger, allows the driver to give the correct signal at all times even in cold and rainy weather when windows are closed.

In accepting the presidency of the new concern Frank C. Jordan, secretary of state said, "I am pleased to be president of the Safeturn Signal Corporation, for it only for one reason we are going to save a lot of lives in California."

These seats will be installed at a cost of \$1,000 per stage.


