 "I do not see a shade of democracy about you," said the Russian aristocrat. He was asked to be specific. He looked baffled.
 "It is hard to say, but I consider myself more democratic than you. I am shocked at the way Americans treat their inferiors, or persons whom they consider their inferiors, their employees, their servants."
 Did this apply to the American's attitude toward other peoples?
Showy in Europe
 "No, I do not mean that," answered the Grand Duke. "I like the pride you have as American citizens. It may go too far, but it is a form of patriotism. Now I confess that I do not really understand what pure democracy can be or how it can exist in the world we inhabit for it implies universal equality and that is absurd. But there is such a thing as democratic intercourse with all people."
 Americans are more showy and plutocratic in Europe than they were before the war, the Grand Duke declared.
 "You have become tremendously rich," he said, "and of course, people with money like to spend it. Still, I believe that Americans are more capable of understanding my ideas. They have got the old tradition to combat, they can better grasp the significance of new forms of life."
 A change in government in Russia depends upon "how long the people's patience will last," the Grand Duke said.
