




CURTAIN TREATMENTS

This is the time of the year when  
the housewife who has moved to a  
new apartment or home is begin-  
ning to think of curtains. Whether  
they shall be long or short, hang  
straight or be draped depends upon  
the type of window and upon the  
room's style of decoration. Whether  
they shall be formal or informal  
also depends upon the style of  
decoration.


The above illustration shows a  
sketch of French doors and dem-  
onstrates a wise curtain treatment.

The swining rods could be of  
bronze, polished steel, wrought iron  
or painted in colors that harmonize  
with the color scheme of the  
room. This clever treatment per-  
mits the curtains to be swung back  
away from the door entrance, thus  
preventing their becoming soiled  
as easily as they would if they  
hung in the wind of the open door.  
Since this is a door leading from  
the formal French living room on  
to the terrace, the hangings would  
be of satin, striped or plain, or  
molle, in delicate colors.




The person who sits at his desk  
a good deal is sometimes overcome  
by the closeness of his surround-  
ings regardless of how large a room  
is, simply because of the lack of an  
interesting outlook. When he  
has before him, however, a view  
such as is illustrated in the sketch  
above, he is happy indeed. Un-  
limited are his horizons, as he sits  
before this expanse. This effect is  
easily enough gained by merely  
placing the desk before the window.  
The sketch above also illustrates

### Cabin of Tri-Motored Ford Plane Has Work-Desk, Refrigerator and Sleeping Quarters.

TAKE three or four steps to-  
ward what you imagine the  
future airplane will be like  
and you have the "flying office."  
It was built for Colonel Charles A. Lin-  
dbergh, Major Thomas G. Lanphier  
and other officers of the Transconti-  
nental Air Transport.

The big plane has just been de-  
livered by the Ford Motor Com-  
pany, which constructed it accord-  
ing to custom design. In aviation  
history it is unique, being the first  
airplane actually built as a mobile,  
business headquarters.

The Transcontinental Air Trans-  
port will use this coaching office in  
completing preparations for the be-  
ginning next March of the first  
combination air and rail passenger  
service across the continent, in  
which it will cooperate with the  
Pennsylvania Railroad, and for con-  
tact work once the service gets  
into swing. Consequently the plane  
may swoop down without notice  
at any airport between the two  
coasts, or in the open country for  
that matter, because the plane is  
in full measure self sufficient.

### Berths With Electric Lights


It has its own sleeping compart-  
ments—upper and lower—of the  
measurements of the ordinary Pull-  
man berth, while its chairs may be  
made reclining and comfortable for  
smoking purposes by any so dis-  
posed. The berths have electric  
lights, so one may read in them  
before dropping off to sleep. In the  
forward section of the cabin is a  
compact refrigerator, probably the  
first designed solely for airplane  
use. It has three compartments,  
one for ice, one for sandwiches,  
the regulation diet of the aviator,

and the third for  
milk, but other  
food may be car-  
ried as well.

The plane has  
been designated  
the "flying office"  
because it was  
built out primar-  
ly for busi-  
ness purposes,  
but it has been  
christened the  
"Columbus," a  
name appropriate  
both because of  
its pioneering  
connotation and  
because Colum-  
bus, Ohio, will be  
the first terminal  
of the transconti-  
nental service,  
where passengers  
who have taken  
the sleeper from  
New York or  
Philadelphia will  
leave their train  
for the day journey westward by  
air.


In the center of the cabin is a  
desk of special design, on either  
side of which are two comfortable,  
leather-upholstered chairs. A flip-  
ping cabinet serves also as a typ-  
ewriter table, and before it is a  
typist's chair. Letters and reports  
may be dictated while the plane is  
en route, and there will be no lost  
time in copying these after the  
plane reaches the ground.

The "Columbus" is a tri-motored,  
all metal Ford transport, of the  
general design and lines of the  
planes that will be used by the  
Transcontinental Air Transport in  
the combination air and rail pas-  
senger service. It is equipped with  
three 400 horsepower Pratt and

Whitney "Wasp" Motors, develop-  
ing a high speed of 135 miles an  
hour and a cruising speed of 115  
miles an hour. It points to several  
aviation developments, important  
among them being the use of a  
new material for the cabin walls.  
An engineering problem with the  
walls of an airplane cabin has been  
to find a very light material that  
will retain heat inside the plane,  
exclude noise and at the same time  
afford the necessary rigidity and  
wearing qualities. The solution  
was found in the Ford-developed  
ply-metal, consisting of two layers  
of aluminum between which has  
been pressed a layer of balsa wood,  
the latter weighing much less than  
cork.
