## RECIPES

### GINGER SNAPS

1 cup molasses.  
1/2 cup shortening.  
3/4 cups Phillips Waffle Flour.  
1 tablespoon ginger.  
Heat molasses to boiling point and pour over shortening. Add flour and ginger sifted. Chill. Roll and bake in moderate oven.

### CORN PUDDING, SOUTHERN STYLE

1 can Golden Bantam Corn (2 1/2 cups. Chop or grind and preferably put through coarse sieve).  
1 teaspoon sugar.  
1 teaspoon salt.  
1/2 teaspoon Folger's paprika.  
2 eggs.  
2 cups milk.  
1 tablespoon butter or bacon fat melted.

Heat the egg yolks and combine with milk and seasoning. Add the ground corn, then fold in beaten whites of eggs lightly. Pour into a buttered baking dish and bake slowly, in a moderate oven for about 45 minutes, standing dish in a pan of hot water as for a custard. (The perfect side partner of cold ham).

### CURRIED EGGS

1 teaspoon flour.  
1 teaspoon Ben-Hur Curry Powder.  
1/2 teaspoon Ben-Hur Onion Salt.  
1/4 teaspoon Ben-Hur Pepper.  
1/2 cup of grated cheese.  
2 cups milk.

Bring milk to the boil, add seasonings and thicken with flour which has been mixed smooth with a little cold water. Pour over hard-boiled eggs, cut in small pieces. Put cheese on top.

### GOLDEN STATE CHEESE BISCUITS

1/2 lb. Golden State American Cheese—rub through grater.  
2 cups Gold Medal flour.  
4 teaspoons Royal baking powder.  
1 teaspoon salt.  
1 tablespoon Fluffo shortening.  
2-3 cup milk.  
Sift and mix dry materials, rub in the shortening and cheese, add milk gradually, toss on slightly floured board, roll one-half inch thick and cut. Place on a baking sheet, and bake in a hot oven 13 to 15 minutes.
