Free Paint Is Offered Cities by Fuller Co.

To Help in Movement to Air-Mark California Communities

SAN FRANCISCO, FEB. 14—Free paint for "air-marking" California communities, as recommended by Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, is offered by W. P. Fuller & Co., San Francisco paint manufacturers, co-operating with the California Development association.

A letter from Frank W. Fuller Jr., secretary of the paint concern, to all chambers of commerce in the state, offers 5 gallons of paint for this purpose, provided only that the community will select a suitable location and have the paint applied.

In the opinion of Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, technical adviser to the Guggenheim Fund, this identification of cities and towns represents one of the most worthwhile steps that can be taken for the advancement of civil aviation. Lindbergh's opinion is shared by other pilots from coast to coast and has the emphatic endorsement of government officials, according to Harry F. Guggenheim. The American Legion likewise has been active in forwarding the movement, now taken up by W. P. Fuller & Co.

'Sample' Dollar Bills Given Out by Local Bank

To Acquaint Public With the New Size Currency

To acquaint the public with the new U. S. currency, which the government will begin to distribute in July, the Bank of Italy today began the distribution of specimens showing the size of the new bills.

According to Ira Clerk, deputy governor of the Federal Reserve Bank in San Francisco, \$1,000,000,000 of the new currency will be placed in circulation during 1929 which, of course, means that a similar amount of the present currency will be retired during the year. The first issue will be in bills of one dollar denomination and will be made available to the public in July.

"The change in the size of the currency is of much greater significance than might appear at first thought," bank officials explained. "It affects every business man and will require a complete change of office equipment. A change in the size of paper currency requires a corresponding change in the size of compartments for holding the bills. It will also require a new size pocket bill fold. Some confusion is bound to result during the period of change owing to the fact that currency of smaller denomination can easily be lost among larger bills unless proper precautions are arranged in advance. It is for this reason that the Bank of Italy is distributing these specimens before the new currency makes its appearance."
