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Torrance Beats Pasadena Team

Return of Regulars Strengthens Locals and They Win 4 to 3

With five of the regulars back in the line-up, Torrance played a great game of ball at Pasadena Sunday to win, 4 to 3 from the Crown City team at Brookside park.

Frost started the scoring for Torrance in the first half of the fourth, when he whaled one to the outfield garden for three bases. Ducauan fanned, and Goldman singled, bringing in Frost. Two hits and a fielder's choice in the fifth failed to bring results, and the sixth was likewise unprofitable, but with the opening of the seventh the Torrance boys started on their favorite pastime of hitting all around and bagged in with three more runs. Eleven hits were garnered off Sabella the Crown City hurler, while Concanannon, the Tanseymen's new pitching ace, held the Pasadena lineup to eight. Pasadena launched hits in the third and the eighth to round up three scores, but were unable to overcome the Torrance lead.

All trails leading to Mount Inena Vista where a gigantic Easter Cross is being erected will be patrolled by members of Avallon Troop 1, Boy Scouts of America, under direction of Scout Master Parlaine Reid, Sr.

An Easter prelude played on the Catalina Chimes by Captain Barney Halstead will signal the forming of the Easter procession on the Bay front at 4:30 a. m. Louis Passarelli will play a concert solo, under the auspices of the depths of the sea at 5:32. Easter services will be opened by prayer led by Rev. La Rue Watson of the Avallon Congregational church. Dr. Walter Dexter will deliver the Easter address. The program: Song, "Christ, the Lord is Risen Today," by the assembly; solo, "Marian Hymns," accompanied on the saxophone by Max Patterson; selection sung by Avallon Congregational Choir; solo, S. E. Carpenter; recessional singing of "Christ Arose" by assembly.

Special arrangements have been made to accommodate the throngs which are expected to attend the Sunrise Services at Catalina. The S. S. Catalina will sail from Wilmington at 10 a. m. Saturday, regular sailing schedule, arriving at the island at noon. Unprecedented advance reservations for Easter are reported from the Hotel St. Catherine, the Hotel Atwater and Island Villa.
