Torrance on Short End of Best Tilt of Year So Far

Fans, we prognosticated last week that the battle between the Tansymen of Torrance and the champs of the Spanish-American league, representing the El Paso Shoe Co. of Los Angeles, which was fought at White Sox park on Easter Sunday, would be a hot and sizzling affair, but we didn't know the half of it. Excitement among the 1000 or more fans that munched peanuts, popcorn and hot dogs in the grand stand, ran to a fever pitch when inning after inning passed, and when Ocampo and Lopez for the home team scampared over the plate in the ninth with the tying and winning runs, there were cheers that bent

Torrance got away to a bad start when Atwood grabbed a fast one and threw wide to Meyler pulling him off the bat and letting Orozco take first. at first. Lopez earned the plaudits of the crowd when he knocked one out of the park for a homer, something he has been trying to do all season. Two runs. Score 4 to 3.

Torrance failed to score in the fourth and fifth. El Paso put over two in the fifth. Score 6 to 3. Things looked bad for the boys in blue but Torrance has never quit yet when things broke bad, so they proceeded to take the pitcher apart in the sixth and seventh for three more runs, one of which was a free gift from Salazar who walked File with the bases already loaded, scoring Atwood. Score 8 and 6.

El Paso made a desperate bid in their half of the sixth, seventh and eighth, but Meyler, who relieved Concannon in the fifth, held them scoreless, although he wobbled a bit in the seventh when one of his slants grazed the portly Ocampo's bay window, and Zuniga waited him out for a free trip to first.

With two out in the eighth, Atwood hit a double, Goodman singled followed by a single from Johnny Ducasau. With all three corners filled, Wolf hit one to center field, scoring Atwood, while Ducasau was thrown out at third ending the inning. Score 7-6.

Final score El Paso 8, Torrance 7.

"This is just one of the many examples of how carelessness can run into money unnecessarily," said Harvel, local Willard Battery dealer.



Newspaper Survey to Be Made by USC Journalists Chief

The University of Southern California has established, effective April 1st, 1929, a Bureau of Field Work, in co-operation with the California Newspaper Publishers' Association, and in charge, of Marc N. Goodnow of the Department of Journalism of the University.

A series of surveys will be conducted covering advertising, marketing, circulation, and editorial problems in both daily and weekly

publication in Southern California, and bulletins will be issued periodically presenting certain findings. The facilities of the Journalism Department of S. C. and nearly 150 students specializing in the study of journalism will be at the disposal of CNPA for research service. Much of Mr. Goodnow's time will be spent in the field, and he will head numerous group meetings on various phases of newspaper work, as well as arrange conferences between publishers and their local advertisers.

Mr. Goodnow, the new field manager, founded the Gary, Indiana, Tribune twenty years ago; was correspondent and feature writer for the Chicago Daily News, Chicago Tribune, and Chicago Record-Herald; and for a number of years has conducted an advertising agency in Los Angeles, at the same time serving as a member of the faculty of the University of Southern California in the Department of Journalism. He will work in close harmony with the managing director of CNPA in his new capacity linking the university and the association.
