

Court Prevents Action on Pier

Injunction Issued by Judge Halts Building at Redondo Beach

REDONDO BEACH.—By action taken at 10 o'clock Monday morning by Judge Walter Gates in department 8 of Superior Court of Los Angeles, the city of Redondo Beach was temporarily restrained from building the proposed new extension to the recently completed municipal pier.

The counsel for the city officials named in the complaint, city attorney Harry Polglase and Arthur Ellis of Los Angeles, agreed that a temporary injunction should be permitted against the execution of the contract for the extension until the permission of the War Department has been secured.

When such permission is obtained from the War Department, the city will have the privilege at any time of going before the Supreme court to show cause why the temporary injunction should be dismissed.

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Lawndale Wells Awaiting Tests

Twelve Bores Standing Cemented; New Projects Under Way

LAWDALE.—With twelve wells cemented off and waiting to make production tests, and six of these already bailing, the next two or three days should settle the question of oil production in a number of wells. The six wells now being tested are the Earl Petroleum Corporation's Sprot No. 1, Standard Oil Co.'s Vance No. 1, Pacific Western's Howland No. 1, Superior Oil Co.'s Security No. 1, Petroleum Securities' Schwabach No. 1, and O'Donnell No. 70. Others standing cemented are the Hancock Lawndale No. 1, Globe No. 1, Standard Thomas No. 1, Continental Winnans Alexander No. 1, Smith Durand No. 1, and Petroleum Securities' Brown No. 2.

New Projects Spring Up

Four new projects are getting under way. The Allied Petroleum Corporation's test well on the Lincoln Mortgage Company's lease, on Ruhland street one block west of Hawthorne boulevard, is placing the machinery and rigging up. It will be ready to begin drilling in about a week's time. Standard Oil company's Freeman No. 1, just south of Mines field, is rigging up and should spud in early next week. The Seape Oil Co. has begun the construction of a derrick on a town lot lease on the north side of Rosecrans avenue, between Shoup and Mulholland avenues. The Montana Oil company has taken four leases, one of which is in Hawthorne territory, and expects to start operations on one of these leases within the next ten days. This is an old established company with a good drilling record. Its offices are located in the Carson Realty company's building on Hawthorne avenue, just west of Market street, Lawndale.

Council Orders Redondo Probe

Shea Motion for Grand Jury Sift Passed by Trustees

REDONDO BEACH.—Upon a motion made by Trustee Shea at the regular meeting of the Redondo Beach city trustees on Monday evening, and placed on file for future action. The bids were as follows: James E. Sun, Long Beach, 25 men, \$150 per concert; 22 men, \$132 per concert; 20 men, \$120 per concert, and for 19 men \$114 per concert. J. R. Scott of Redondo Beach offered a band of 22 men for \$110 per concert of two hours duration. This bidder was awarded the contract last year. A total of 33 concerts is given during the season, and Trustee Hoyt suggested that the contract be awarded at an early date, inasmuch as the concerts commence the first week of June, and the bands would like some time to organize and practice.

Several members of the audience made short talks congratulating the city upon the action they had taken, and expressing their confidence in the present administration. Mayor Hopkins stated in reply that the trustees had deferred taking this drastic course of action from time to time, always hoping that they would be able to harmoniously put into effect the progressive steps they had planned for the betterment of the city. She also stated that this course had finally become necessary because of the continued attacks against their efforts to further the interests of Redondo Beach.
