Combination Engineering Advances and Body Design Feature Oakland Six

Building further towards its reputation as a pioneer of new engineering achievement widely adopted throughout the industry, the Oakland All-American Six, displayed by Industrial City Motors, Torrance dealer, reveals mechanical advances that are changing the insight with its new and different body lines.

Just as in the past Duo finish, four wheel brakes, crankcase ventilation, the Harmonic balancer, tilting beam headlights with foot control, gasoline pump, and many other chassis improvements first appeared on the Oakland line, so the All-American Six boasts more than fifty refinements, many of them exclusive to the car in its price field.

A quick mechanical picture of the new Oakland shows a larger and flecter power plant, a new patented rubber engine support, new Oakland-developed internal expanding self-energizing four wheel brakes, larger cross-flow radiator, counterbalanced crankshaft, larger three-port intake manifolds, and unique lubrication of cylinder walls.

Interpreted in terms of performance, the new refinements mean quick vibrational acceleration of from ten to 25 miles an hour in five second flat, and a top speed of well over 70 miles an hour, according to tests under the stop watch at the General Motors Proving Ground, where the new car was made ready for the public.

Built on a 117-inch wheelbase, the new power plant develops 68 horsepower at 3,000 revolutions per minute, 28 cubic inches, increased from 312 cubic inches last year, by enlarging the bore to 3 3/8 inches from 3 1/4 inches. Stroke remains at 4 1/4 inches.

The engine is the L-head type, with a high compression G-M-R head, pioneered by Oakland, which may be removed without interference with the ignition, and with provision for a built-in thermostat. A feature of the head is a semi-circular baffle located directly above the piston which is claimed to give maximum freedom from detonation. Compression ratio is 4.9 to 1.

The power plant is mounted on four supports and insulated from the frame by rubber "biscuits," developed by Oakland engineers and exclusive to the latest All-American. The design of the "biscuits" is unique because it is impossible for a mechanic to change the compression of the rubber, no matter how hard he draws down on the fastening nut.

By decreasing the size of the hexagons in the new copper core of the cross-flow radiator, increased cooling is provided, while thermostatic control has been an Oakland feature for the past few years. The Oakland pioneered the cross-flow principle of radiator having special valve in winter driving and allows for efficient operation with the water level at only two-thirds the height of the radiator core, thus lowering the possibility of freezing.

A new and larger vertical type carburetor has an accelerator pump and economizer. The improved intake manifold has three ports, one with riser heated by the exhaust from all six cylinders, and a heat control valve so located as to carry excess heat away from the driver's compartment.

How to Play BRIDGE Series 1928-29 by Wynne Ferguson Author of "PRACTICAL AUCTION BRIDGE"

There has been much discussion as to the advisability of bidding four or more of a suit headed by the ace king without an outside trick. Practically all players agree that such a bid is a losing bid.

From a defensive standpoint there is no doubt as to the value of bidding top cards, such as ace king suits with four or more, on the opening round. If you pass such a hand, the contract may be too high to justify a bid on the second round.


For example, suppose the dealer passes with the foregoing hand, second hand bids one heart, the dealer's partner passes and the partner of the heart bidder says "three hearts". What can the dealer do then? His hand is too weak to bid three spades, so he is forced to pass and his partner, without the information given by the spade bid, is forced to guess as to the proper lead and is more apt to guess wrong than right.

Don't hesitate to bid a suit contract on top cards on the first round of bidding and thus anticipate an adverse declaration that otherwise might puzzle partner as to the proper lead. Such bids are always sound defensive bids and the advantages of bidding them more than outweigh their disadvantages.

For example, here are two hands where the lead is an important factor: Hearts - A, 7, 6; Clubs - 10, 8, 5; Diamonds - Q, J, 9, 7, 5; Spades - Q, 9.

No score, rubber game. Z dealt and passed. A bid one heart, Y bid two diamonds, B bid four hearts and all passed. What is Y's proper lead? The only lead that would have saved game in this hand was the queen of spades; but how many players would be able to guess that lead? The normal opening is the queen of diamonds and with this opening A B will easily score game.
