Legion in Big Member Drive

With the announcement by Carl Morgan of Long Beach, chairman of the Nineteenth District Membership committee of the American Legion of which the Bert S. Crossland Post is a member, that an intensive membership campaign has been launched throughout the district, officers of the Torrance post have started a concerted drive in this territory to put the local post on the top.

The district membership is a part of the program of the posts to elect their District Commander C. C. McGonigal of Bell, to the state commandery at the San Diego convention, to be held August 19-20-21, 1929.

In order to make their presence felt a large membership is necessary for two purposes, declare officials of the local post. First in order to have the proper standing at the coming convention, where the delegations are seated according to their rank in membership.

The nineteenth district must reach the quota assigned it and secondly a record breaking membership will give them a large voting power on the floor of the convention because the voting power of the districts is based upon the membership of the local posts.

The drive being conducted by Chairman Morgan is in co-operation with the committee of the local post is expected to put the nineteenth district at the top of the percentage column in the Department of California, declared Chairman Morgan. C. C. McGonigal the district's candidate for commandery is one of the outstanding Legionnaires of the Department of California and has one of the greatest war records of any veteran who has run for that high office.

McGonigal served overseas with the First Division and was wounded in action, losing both hands while storming a machine gun nest.

Immediately after the close of the war, McGonigal joined the American Legion and became active in the affairs of Post No. 1, Minneapolis. McGonigal came to Los Angeles six years ago and has risen from the ranks to his present position of district commander.

Under his leadership, the Nineteenth district has come to be known as one of the most active and efficient in the department, and was the first to adopt the new district plan after the reorganization of the Department at the San Francisco convention.

Commander Jameson of the Torrance Post announces here will be started at once and that a strong committee under the direction of Chairman Bailey will take the field in an effort to put the local post over the top at the earliest possible moment. He calls upon all citizens in this territory to aid the Bert S. Crossland Post by furnishing names of World War veterans who do not yet belong to the American Legion, and to talk up the local campaign at every opportunity.
