Pioneer Passes to His Reward

Walter Tappin Sr., Dies at Torrance Hospital After Accident

Walter Tappin, Sr., 1354 Normandie avenue, died early Tuesday morning at the Torrance hospital just four weeks after the auto accident in which he was badly injured.

At 3:30 Tuesday morning, Mr. Tappin called his nurse and complained of severe stomach pains. The nurse administered a homely remedy, remained with him until he was asleep, and then went back to bed.

Walter Tappin was born in London, England, December 9, 1853, and became a resident of the United States when he was about 25 years of age.

Mr. Tappin had been a member of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows for 35 years; was an active member of Triple City Lodge, No. 333 and Trio Rebekah Lodge; and was well known in Masonic, Eastern Star and Amaranth circles, through the affiliations of Mrs. Tappin and their sons.

Survivors are his widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Tappin; three sons, Walter, Arthur and Edward Tappin; other members of the family well known in Lomita and Torrance, are Mrs. Tappin's sister and niece, Mrs. J. O. Moore and Mrs. W. H. Stanger.

Funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock, Wednesday afternoon, in the Roosevelt Memorial Park. Stone and Myers were in charge of funeral arrangements.
