Bank of Italy Changes System of Organization

Will Better Community Service of Smaller Banks Is Claimed

A statewide reorganization of the supervisory system of the Bank of Italy National Trust and Savings Association was announced today by James A. Baigalupi, president of the bank.

Under the new plan, which goes into immediate operation, the 22 districts, into which the system has heretofore been divided, are abolished. In their stead, the 291 branches throughout California are regrouped into 11 enlarged districts, each under the direction of a supervisor with headquarters either in San Francisco or Los Angeles.

This step is taken in line with established Bank of Italy policy of affording our customers in the smaller communities all of the banking advantages enjoyed by depositors in our major cities," Baigalupi stated. "Heretofore, in most instances, the duties of supervisor have been exercised by managers who have been given their entire time to branch management. In the past, contact has been maintained by correspondence and by occasional visits of the managers to head of office. Now, through our full time supervisors, continually circulating in their districts and reporting regularly to the head offices, we will be in closer touch with local conditions throughout California and able, at all times, to render helpful and efficient service to meet the special needs of each community."

The list of changes in the Los Angeles division is as follows: C. K. Dodds, manager Wilshire-Western office, becomes supervisor in charge of the 47 offices in the city of Los Angeles. He is succeeded as manager of Wilshire-Western by Norman Frazer, present manager of Pico Heights branch.

Los Angeles, G. A. Baker, present assistant cashier at Wilshire-Western, becomes assistant manager. Frazer is succeeded as manager of the Pico Heights branch by Donald H. Coyne, present assistant cashier. J. P. Kennedy, manager at Santa Barbara and supervisor, is relieved of his managerial duties and will devote his time exclusively to the 32 branches in the enlarged Los Angeles suburban district comprising 7 branches in Long Beach, 6 in Ventura and Pismo, 2 in Santa Barbara and 14 in Los Angeles suburbs. Warner Edmonds, transferred to Santa Barbara, to succeed Mr. Kennedy. He is succeeded at Chula Vista by Edwin T. Smith, the present assistant manager there. A. C. Dimon, vice president at Bakersfield, will continue as manager of the Bakersfield branch and will supervise the 3 branches from Wasco to Taft. O. T. Jensen, manager of the Coronado branch, is made supervisor of the San Diego district. Martin Weastus is appointed manager at Coronado.
