

Lads Here Prepare for Finals in Junior Olympics at L. A. June 1

Thousands of athletically inclined youngsters of Southern California, including boys in Torrance, are engaged in preparing for county finals in the second annual Junior Olympic Games competition. Nine counties are entered in the program this year, with one of these districts already having staged its meet.

Dates for the other meets have been announced by the executive committee as follows: Imperial county, May 11 at El Centro; San Luis Obispo, May 11 at San Luis Obispo; San Bernardino, May 18 at San Bernardino; Ventura, May 18 at Ventura; Orange, May 18 at Orange; Santa Barbara, May 25 at La Cumbre Junior High School in Santa Barbara; Riverside, May 25 at Riverside; and Los Angeles county at Los Angeles. Inyo County's meet has been held.

Winners and those making high scores in both senior and junior divisions will come to Los Angeles for the Southern California finals to be held June 1. Following the finals here, the two leading seniors and two best juniors will go through several weeks of industrial training to prepare themselves for the national finals at Atlantic City during the first week in July.

Upon their return from Atlantic City the four lucky boys will be sent to Honolulu with all expenses paid and a chaperon provided.

There is a terrific battle on for first place in both junior and senior division. Scores of totals have

already been reported to headquarters while some sections have not sent in their ratings. Fernando Ramos of Ross Snyder Playground has the highest score among the seniors, having amassed 579 points in a recent meet. Robert San Jose of Wilmington is second to Ramos with 623 points. Other leading seniors whose scores have been reported are as follows: Walter Waers, Arroyo Seco Playground, 596; George Warboys, Queen Anne playground, 570; Bert Merrill, Torrance High School, 576; Mike Pina, Evergreen Playground, 554; Leonard Reed, Yosemite Playground, 545; Ralph Pearson, El Monte high school, 543; Dick Carson, Wilmington Playground, 539; Clarence Fields, San Bernardino, 517, and Norman DeWeeks, San Bernardino, 512.

Among the juniors there has been fewer high scores reported but there promises to be a great battle between the four or five youngsters who are leading. Lyle Breslin of the San Bernardino Y.M.C.A. has the highest score, having rolled up points. Jerry Deal, Southern California junior champ last year, ranks second with 611. Others are Bruce Kelly, El Monte, 580; Paul Lee, Arroyo Seco Playground, 579; and James Miller, Torrance, 567.

Undoubtedly there are a flock of youngsters in out of town districts who are just as capable as many of those whose names are given here, but unfortunately scores of these "unknowns" have not been reported to headquarters so their light is hid under a bushel for the time being.
