Transatlantic Telephone Service Opened to Europe
Transatlantic telephone service, regarded with skepticism slightly more than a year ago, has come again to the foreground with the announcement of F. N. Rush, general manager of The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company, that an entirely new voice channel is now open between the United States and Europe. Mr. Rush stated that a new short-wave telephone transmitting center completed at Lawrenceville, New Jersey, has been tested and found successful. It is planned to have two more

voice channels on short-wave frequencies opened before the end of the year. Another will be operated between Buenos Aires, Argentina, and the United States as soon as it is possible to arrange it. The phenomenal increase in use of transatlantic telephone conversations made necessary the new short-wave system. Four conversations will be carried over the ocean simultaneously when the present short-wave channel is augmented by the other two now under construction. The original long-wave system will not be discarded.

This step ahead in communication has been the result of months of experiment and testing by engineers of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company and the Bell telephone laboratories. The transmitting antennae for Europe are strung on a line of 19,350-foot steel towers, placed 250 feet apart and at right angles to the direction in which the voice waves travel. Each of the channels will use three horizontal aeriels grouped together. These aeriels, cross-connected by wires, resemble a huge irregular mesh. Behind the transmitting antennae is a second similar arrangement designed to reflect the voice waves from the transmitting antennae and to reinforce them. When completed, each antennae will be able to transmit on three different wave lengths. No interference will result when all the channels are busy at the same time. Calls from Southern California will be completed to Europe over the new short-wave system as well as the long-wave equipment at once, Mr. Rush stated.
