## Can You Pass The Examination?

You Must Answer These Questions if You Drive Your Car Unless Your Operators' License Is Dated After January 1st, 1927

Questions that must be answered by motorists before receiving their new operators licenses which will have to be obtained by all drivers who have received their present drivers license before January 1, 1927, according to the provisions of the new California law effective August 14, are as follows:

- 1.—What is the maximum speed allowed by law in the following districts?
  - (a) Business? Ans. 15 miles per hour.
  - (b) Residence? Ans. 20 miles per hour.
  - (c) School zones? Ans. 15 miles per hour.
  - (d) Public highway outside of city limits? Ans. 40 miles per hour.
  - (e) What is the speed limit across blind railroad grade crossings? Ans. 15 miles per hour.
- 2.—What does the law require of you in case of serious accident? Ans. You must stop and give aid, give names and addresses of your passengers, not exceeding five, and your license number, and make a report to the Division of Motor Vehicles or to police headquarters, such report to be made within 24 hours.
- 3.—Which vehicle has the right of way when two vehicles reach an intersection at about the same time? Ans. The vehicle coming from the right.
- 4.—Is it ever lawful to pass another vehicle at an intersection except when told to do so by an officer? Ans. No.
- 5.—What is a blind intersection? Ans. Where the driver's view is obstructed for 200 feet during the last 100 feet before reaching the intersection.
- 6.—What is the speed limit crossing blind intersections? Ans. 15 miles per hour.
- 7.—In what position on the street approaching an intersection must a car be before turning to the left.
  - Ans.—Center of street or left line of traffic.
  - (a) Right? Ans. Inside line, or right line nearest curb.
  - 8.—How near the curb shall your car be when parking parallel with the curb? Ans. Within 12 inches.
  - 9.—What does the law require you to do when driving away from the curb? Ans. See that you will not interfere with any vehicle and that you can do so safely. You must give the signal by extending your arm.
  - 10.—Do vehicles on the highway always have the right of way over vehicles entering the highway from a private drive? Ans. Yes.
  - 11.—Under what conditions may a vehicle stand inside of 15 feet from a fire plug? Ans. Only while there is a licensed driver in the vehicle.
  - 12.—How should you park on the highway outside city limits? Ans. Drive off main travel or paved portion before parking.
  - 13.—Does the law permit parking in front of a private driveway? Ans. No. Nor in front of a garage entrance or fire station.
  - 14.—What does the law require when leaving a vehicle unattended? Ans. The motor must be stopped and brakes set.
  - 15.—Is it permissible to park your car on the highway outside city limits to change a tire? Ans. Not if it is physically possible to get off the highway.
  - 16.—What are the proper signals to give when—
    - (a) Turning to the left? Ans. Hold arm straight out.
    - (b) Turning to the right? Ans. Hold arm out with forearm and hand pointing up.
    - (c) Stopping? Ans. Extend hand and arm down.
  - 17.—How far before turning or stopping should the signal be given? Ans. The arm should be kept out during the last 50 feet, at least before turning or stopping.
  - 18.—Where does the law permit you to make a U turn? Ans. At an intersection, or in the residence district when no vehicle is approaching within 200 feet in either direction.
  - 19.—What procedure does the law require when you hear a siren? Ans.—Drive to the right of street or highway and stop, but do not stop in an intersection.
  - 20.—When does the law permit passing a standing street car? Ans. When there are regular safety zones or when you have room to keep your vehicle six feet from the running board, or steps of the street car and at the rate of 10 miles per hour.
  - 21.—When does the law require lights on vehicles to be turned on? Ans. One-half hour after sunset to one-half hour before sunrise, and any other time when a substantial object is not visible at 200 feet. (Note—Both headlights and tail-light must be lighted, regardless of what other lights are lighted.)
  - 22.—What does the law require at boulevard stops? Ans. Vehicle must stop and not proceed across street or into street until they can do so safely.
  - 23.—What vehicles have the right of way at all times? Ans. Police and fire vehicles, ambulances.
  - 24.—What vehicles are required to stop at railroad crossings? Ans. Vehicles carrying passengers for hire, stages, school buses, or loads of inflammables or explosives.
  - 25.—Do you know the penalty for driving recklessly or under the influence of intoxicating liquors or drugs? Ans. Maximum penalty for reckless driving is \$250 fine or 90 days in jail or both. Maximum penalty for driving while drunk is 3 years in prison or \$5000 fine.
  - 26.—In what position upon the highway are you required to operate a motor vehicle? Ans. On the right-hand side.
  - 27.—Where does the law require you to keep your registration card? Ans. In plain sight in the driver's compartment.
  - 28.—Are loads allowed to project from the sides of passenger vehicles? Ans. They must not project beyond the line of the hub caps on the left side, nor more than six inches beyond the line of the hub caps on the right side.
  - 29.—Is it lawful to pass a vehicle which is about to pass another vehicle going in the opposite direction? Ans.—Vehicles passing each other in opposite directions have the right of way and it is unlawful to pass between two such vehicles unless there is sufficient road width to give one-half the highway to the vehicle coming toward you.
  - 30.—What does the law require of you when another vehicle gives a signal showing that it desires to pass? Ans.—You must give way to the right, if possible, and not increase speed until completely passed.
  - 31.—Is it lawful to follow another vehicle on the public highway outside city limits, closer than 15 feet? Ans. No.
  - 32.—Is it unlawful for license plates to be obscured? Ans. Yes. They must be attached so as to be clearly visible and kept free from foreign matter so that they can be easily read.
  - 33.—How soon after moving are you required by law to notify the Division of Motor Vehicles of your new address? Ans. Within 10 days.
  - 34.—Is it unlawful for any person to allow his child under 21 years, or employee, regardless of age, to drive without the proper license? Ans. Yes.
  - 35.—Is it lawful to pass on a curve where the driver does not have a clear view of at least 150 feet? Ans. No.
