

or inside the box or the sheets would adhere to each other.

When these annealed plates have been permitted to cool gradually they are what is known as black sheets, and ready in this form for the market. It is of this substance that the common stout pipe is made. However, for every 30 black sheets which are sold on the market, there are 70 galvanized sheets, so many of the sheets go from the annealing box to the galvanizing process.

Galvanizing

The galvanizing process consists of a series of baths, very similar to developing a film. The big sheets are first placed in racks, and then doused in a six to seven percent solution of sulphuric acid, where they are kept for about half an hour. This bath tends to clean the surface of the sheet of all foreign substance, in order that the zinc which is to be applied later, will adhere rigidly and evenly. The sheets are then passed through a cold water bath to remove the acid, and then again doused in a muriatic acid solution, this time of about three percent strength.

The sheets are then passed through a solution of pure zinc, kept at a temperature of 800 degrees Fahrenheit. They are, in fact, rolled through this solution, so that as they emerge from the bath the zinc will appear evenly all over the surface. The last roller squeezes all surplus zinc from the surface of the plate, so that for every square foot of surface to the sheet there is but one ounce of zinc.

The sheet is now galvanized, and when permitted to cool from the zinc bath, the zinc is allowed to crystallize, forming spangles, and the sheet is ready to adorn the walls of an industrial building in Torrance or of a garage in Timbuctoo.

The last remaining operation in big sheet-mills is the corrugating, or "permanent waving" and this is accomplished by feeding the galvanized sheet through a press which corrugates it. For this operation it is not necessary to heat the sheet.

A visitor to the Llewellyn Mills is impressed, first, by the vastness of the enterprise. The spacious galvanized steel buildings are laid out systematically, and although it is a long walk from the front of the sheet mills to the last big warehouse, there is still much room for expansion. Hidden away in the big plant is one of the finest equipped machine shops in all of California, and the entire time of the shop is taken up with plant work, no commercial work being done in this department. There is also an elaborate power house, where the huge dynamos are kept quietly running day in and day out.

to supply necessary power. There are the boiler rooms, the pump houses and pumps which supply water for the plant from two artesian wells; the carpenter shop, the administrative offices, the first aid building; all are integral parts of the one big unit.

Although the popular conception of the manufacture of steel is that it is a dirty, grimy business, akin to coal mining, this is far from the true state of affairs. Of course, white collars are conspicuous by their absence, but the atmosphere of the plant is remarkably free of gaseous odors, dust and dirt.

You'll find all the men at the Llewellyn Mills, from the lowliest laborer to the efficient foreman, going about their business with an air of satisfaction—the big plant seems to go along without visible direction. Every man knows what is expected of him, and does it. The result is harmony, and harmony is a synonym for efficiency and happiness.

Conjure up, if you can, a mental vision of this vast enterprise, and then, when the occasion presents itself, take a trip of inspection through the Llewellyn Mills; gain a first hand knowledge of one of the vital reasons why Torrance is, in fact, a modern industrial city.
