E. - TORRANCE SEWER WORK AT STANDSTILL

Hook Up With Metropolitan System Held Up Pending Action of L. A. Council

Local sewers in the shoe string strip of the City of Los Angeles, east of Torrance, have been completed and property owners are called upon to pay for assessments for this work, yet will not be able to use the sewers but will have to continue with cesspools until the City of Los Angeles completes a contract with County Sanitation District No. 5 for the disposal of sewage from the shoe string strip, according to a letter transmitted to the City Council today by A. K. Warren, chief engineer of the county sanitation districts.

The letter was in response to a query by the city engineer of Los Angeles as to whether the district would receive sewage from the city before the contract between the City of Los Angeles and the district for this purpose has been executed. The city engineer set out in his communication that the property owners in the City of Los Angeles area wish to know at once whether they have to continue with cesspools or not, and according to Mr. Warren's letter it is evident that they will have to unless the Los Angeles city council will take some final action on the contract.

This matter has been pending before the Los Angeles Council for more than a year. Local sewers in the city area of Gardena were completed many months ago. The only way in which the sewage from the shoe string strip can be disposed of is through the county sanitation districts system. This system has been in operation and ready to take such sewage since April, 1928, yet no final action has been taken by the council.


Over one hundred children have been enrolled. The parents of the children who attended are earnestly requested to be present at the program and exhibit.
