## NEW MONETA SUB STATION FOR EDISON

Increased Demands of Torrance Industries and Growing Residential District Require Larger Sub-Station

The present Edison sub-station at Western and Palm avenues is to be replaced with a new sub-station building at New York and Market streets in Moneta, at a cost of \$42,497, it was announced this week by C. W. Koerner, district manager. Moneta is included in the communities to be served.

An attractive brick building with the roofing has been designed, Mr. Koerner said. The electrical distribution facilities to be installed will include the latest type heavy duty transformer and switching equipment. The capacity of the station will be 2000 horsepower. Provision is to be made for future additions at the station in order that additional capacity may be added from time to time as the need for electric energy in the Moneta section continues to expand.

Other communities included in the Redondo Beach district are Torrance, Lomita, Redondo Beach, Hermosa, Manhattan, Gardena, Redondo Villa and Palos Verdes. The increasing requirements of this large district for electric service for domestic, industrial and agricultural uses are indicated in the growing totals of meters in service and of the connected load this year as compared with the totals for the same period last year.

district was 14,730, an increase of 576 over the total of 14,204 the same date last year. The total of 60,577 horsepower of connected load on June 1 this year shows an increase of 10,965 horsepower during the last twelve months, advancing from a total of 49,612 horsepower for January 1, 1928. The increase in connected load for the district since January 1, this year, totaled 5,824 horsepower. The use of electric energy for industrial purposes in the district is shown in the total of 40,866 horsepower for this purpose supplied to June 1 this year. The total on the same date a year ago was 31,822 horsepower.


The industries of Torrance and the Redondo Beach district have contributed substantially to the total of 189,414 horsepower\* of new business realized by the Southern California Edison company during the first six months of this year, Mr. Koerner said. The six months total of new business contracted for by the company is approximately fifty-three percent of the total of 358,000 horsepower anticipated as new business for the entire year.
